ROYAL BANK EXPANSION

Announcement is made that the Royal Bank of Canada will open a branch at St. Stephen at once. The new branch at Sussex will also be opened in a day or so. With the opening of offices at these two places the number of the bank in this province will be eighteen.

NOT TO FURNISH INFORMATION.

The city will not furnish the Board of Health with a list of those properties connected with the sewerage system, those not connected and those for which application for leave to make connection has been made. The books of the city dealing with the matter are open to inspection, however, and the officers of the Board of Health are at liberty to get what information they desire from them.

MOVING PICTURE SHOW LAW

Rev. H. E. Thomas and Mr. F. G. Spencer of St. John arrived in the city this morning registering at the Queen and interviewed both the Provincial Secretary, Hon. H. P. McLeod and the Attorney General, Hon. W. C. H. Gummer with regard to certain proposed alterations in the provincial law governing moving. It is understood that the contemplated alteration is for the purpose of excluding children under ten years of age and unattended, from matinee performances.

DIED THIS MORNING

The death of Leo Boyd, clerk in the provincial department of Public Works, occurred this morning at his home in this city after a lingering illness. The deceased was twenty-one years of age and had been in the Public Works Department about a year, succeeding the late Leonard Bellevue. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Boyd of this city, also by two sisters and three brothers, Mary, Cecilia, Chas. and Morris at home and James of Battleford. The funeral will take place Friday morning at nine o'clock with High Mass at St. Dunstan's Church. The deceased was a well known and popular young man and his untimely death is generally regretted.

INSTRUCTION IN
FIRST AID TO BE
GIVEN I. C. R. MEN

Messrs D. Pottinger, W. C. Paver and E. Price Meet Men at Gihson This Afternoon in That Connection

Steps are being taken to have the employees on the Fredericton Branch of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada instructed in first aid. This instruction is to be given under the direction of the St. John Ambulance Association, an empire-wide body the head of which is His Majesty King George. In Canada the Governor General, H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, is head of the association.

Today Mr. D. Pottinger of the I. C. R. Board of Management, Mr. W. C. Paver, secretary of the I. C. R. Provident Fund and Mr. Evan Price, Divisional Superintendent of the I. C. R., arrived in the city this morning registering at the Barker House, and this afternoon at three o'clock met a number of the employees of the Fredericton Branch with a view toward making a beginning in first aid instruction.

This has been a fact on other parts of the I. C. R. system centres for the work being established at St. John, Moncton, Halifax, Sydney, New Glasgow and elsewhere. Other railways also have taken up the matter.

Messrs. Pottinger, Price and Paver will leave again this evening.

TEMPORARY BANK PREMISES.

Contractor Moses Mitchell has about completed installation of the temporary fixtures of the local branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in the Howie building. The fixtures are unlike the usual bank fixtures and are attracting much attention. Mr. Mitchell is also making the installation of the fixtures in the temporary quarters in the Twining building which the Royal Bank of Canada will occupy while the bank building is being altered.

VALUATION FIXED

By resolution passed last night the city council has fixed the assessment valuation of the Victoria Mill recently acquired by the firm of Fraser, Limited, at an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars. Dwellings near the Victoria Mill which also have been acquired by that firm are not included, however, in the terms of the resolution. The city has also agreed to repair and maintain the highway leading to the mill.

DIVERSION OF ROADS
DONE WITHOUT CITY
BEING CONSULTED

St. John & Quebec Railway Company to be Asked for Authority and Plans for Highway Division—Numerous Complaints

The St. John & Quebec Railway Company is to be asked by the city authorities by what right it has diverted the highways within the city limits at points where they are intersected by the right of way of the railway. The company is also to be asked what provision is being made for the construction and proper grading of crossings at those intersections. Plans of diversions and crossings are also to be requested.

This matter was brought before the City Council at last night's regular meeting by Ald. Moore, chairman of the Road Committee, who said complaints were being made concerning the diversion of the highway in the western end of the city by the railway. Ald. Kitchen and Ald. Ryan both spoke on the matter saying that if the new road through the fields were not properly gravelled at an early date, it would be positively impossible next spring for vehicles to travel over it.

Comment was also made upon the diversion of the highway in the eastern part of the city and upon the condition of the Wilsey Road crossing. The Road Department had not been consulted with regard to either it was said, but the Road Commissioner had inspected the diversion and reported that it was satisfactory.

On the motion of Ald. Calder it was decided to communicate with the railway company asking for the information mentioned previously. If the city's communication is not answered a special meeting of the City Council is to be called to deal with the matter.


Ald. Cruikshank suggested that if necessary an injunction could be obtained preventing the railway company from proceeding until satisfactory arrangements had been made with regard to the highways.

MAY ADOPT LEGAL MEASURES.

It was decided at last night's meeting of the City Council that the city treasurer be instructed to proceed with taxes in arrears by legal measures if necessary. Tax collections for the month of October amounted to \$1217, about the same as during the corresponding month of 1911.




