FALL OF ANTWERP
SUPREME TRAGEDY
SAYS DR. BELAND

to get to Cappelen (where his wife was) at any cost, for I knew how anxious they would be as to my safety. At noon as I was setting ready to depart from Antwerp a bomb burst almost in the heart of the city. The terrified population were running in all directions in order to escape the Germans. The Chateau where I was was some five kilometers distant. I counted as many as thirty-five cannon shots to the minute. When I got to Cappelen we went up into the tower of the Chateau, and in the night looked down across the trees at the flashes of fire and the streaks of light across the height where the nocturnal duel was going on.

"It was a supreme tragedy. At moments when four or five batteries of four cannons each were discharged at once one could feel the earth tremble. From Monday morning until Friday noon the most dreadful procession of centuries passed before us. We had in the gardens of the Chateau thousands of refugees sleeping in the open air. At night the Chateau itself sheltered some five hundred vehicles of all kinds, hay wagons filled with refugees. Dr. Beland, ex-postmaster general in the Laurier administration told of his experiences during the siege and capture of Antwerp by the Germans last month while he was there attending to his duties as an active member of the Belgian Hospital Corps.

Dr. Beland came through the awful experiences of that siege without harm as he formerly did through the siege at Liege. After the entry of the Germans he was allowed to proceed to Holland with his wife, and reached there in safety. According to the last advice from him, he expects to be able to join the Canadian Medical Corps at the front.

In the course of a letter written on October 19, which came via Holland, Hon. Dr. Beland says:

"On Tuesday at Antwerp both the morning papers published an official proclamation warning the population to leave the city before three o'clock as the bombardment of the suburbs could already be heard. The doctors helped us to get the wounded but not the dead, into places of safety, either to Ghent or Ostend by the free road which still remained along the coast to the west.

"I found it was necessary for me with household debris, cradles piled up with babies, dog carts drawn by dogs pulling along old men of eighty and ninety years. A mother with her baby of three days old, slept here in the cellar. We had no other place for her. It was an awful caravan, bloodstained and homes desecrated, or menaced by the invading host, an endless flood along the whole of the road."

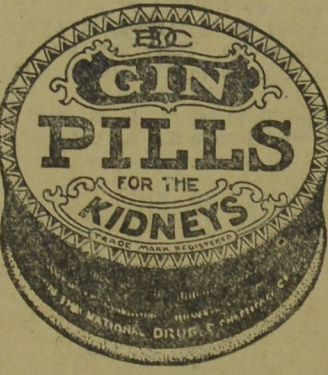


Mrs. Wm. Toland wore black braided silk with bouquet of garnet carnations.
