BIG AUSTRIAN FORCE

Continued from page 1.

The Russians' left wing has followed the Kielce railway to the Austrian front, and is within a few miles of Cracow, the siege of which is imminent.

The southern army, under General Ruzsky, is at Rzeszow, between Przemysl and Cracow, and its crossing of the San River is being opposed by the Austrians. Another detachment continues the siege of Przemysl, while still another is operating against the Austrians who are holding the passage of the Carpathians.

The army of Armenta, whose base is on Kars, Trans-Caucasia, is approaching the Turkish fortress of Erzerum.

The manner in which Grand Duke Nicholas, the Russian commander-in-chief, is wielding these armies, and the mobility they are showing, are the subject of admiration on the part of military men here.

There is a steady flow of recruits for Kitchener's army, and it is expected that, with the Territorials, who number 690,000, England before long will have an army of two million men. New armies are also being organized in India.

BRITAIN'S FIGHTING ARMY.

Premier Asquith, according to report, will ask parliament at an early date to give sanction to the raising of additional troops to the number of 1,000,000 for war service, thus bringing the total up to 2,000,000 men. It is also understood that the government intends to issue a war loan of \$1,000,000,000.

In the British House of Commons, Arthur Henderson, the Labor party leader, has made the announcement that organized labor felt that the only course now open was to go straight through with the war until success crowned the efforts of the Allies.

Great Britain and France have warned Ecuador and Colombia that they will not countenance further violations of neutrality by them. Representations have been made at Quito and Bogota to this effect and the United States government has been notified in view of possible complications that might arise.

No specific violations have been mentioned, but, it is believed, the warnings were the result of charges that islands off the Ecuadorian coast have been used by the Germans as coaling stations and that wireless stations in both Ecuador and Colombia have been giving information to German cruisers.

Ottawa, Nov. 9, 1914.

My dear Mr. Hatheway:

I have been deputed by His Royal Highness the Governor General to express to you his sympathy for the loss of your gallant son in action off the coast of Chili and to request you to convey to his sister and brothers, this message. His Royal Highness understands that it was owing to his zeal, ability and usefulness that Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock chose your son and his three comrades to go to the Good Hope with him from the Suffolk. Although the compliment has resulted in the loss of your son and his three gallant comrades in the Good Hope, still it must ever be a great satisfaction to you all that he died nobly while fighting for the honor and integrity of the empire in the service he had chosen for a profession. I hope you will also accept my sincere sympathy in your loss and believe me,

THE HOME GUARD MET AND ORGANIZED

Upwards of one hundred young men assembled at the Drill Hall last evening and completed the organization of the Fredericton Home Guard Association. Mr. A. D. Thomas, who has done a lot of hard work in connection with the movement, occupied the chair and Mr. J. B. Dickson acted as secretary.

A lengthy report of a committee appointed at a previous meeting was read by Secretary Dickson and adopted section by section. It stated that no status had been accorded by the militia department to such an organization and it could not come under any arm of the service for a period less than three years.

The committee recommended that a voluntary association be formed with the object of becoming proficient in drill, procedure and tactics and the use of arms, that Sergt. H. T. Brewer be chief drill instructor; that the members be formed into three companies and that each assemble one night a week for drill.

Sergt. H. T. Brewer, besides acting as chief drill instructor, will have command of the companies until officers are selected.

Mr. J. D. Palmer was elected president of the association, and Mr. J. B. Dickson was chosen permanent secretary.

It was decided to meet for drill on the evenings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The companies will be known as "A," "B" and "C." The members of "A" Company will meet for their first drill next Monday evening.

On motion of Rev. Dean Schofield, seconded by Mr. A. R. Shipp, M.P.P., a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. A. D. Thomas for his services in organizing the guard and at the suggestion of Mr. E. H. Allen he was made honorary colonel of the same.

Mr. Thomas returned thanks in a brief speech which was very heartily applauded.

THE ARBITRATION CASE.
