MISS VANWART

TALKS ABOUT HER EXPERIENCES

Was Crossing the English Channel When Word Came That War Had Been Declared---Had Trouble in Getting Passage Home

"Germany has spent years in preparing for the present war and in Leipzig the people were aware of the inevitable long before the war was declared," was the statement made to a representative of The Mail this morning by Miss Helen VanWart, B.A., daughter of ex-Ald. and Mrs. A. H. VanWart, who returned Wednesday from Germany, where she had been studying music for the past year.

Miss VanWart had left Germany before the declaration of war and had started on a tour through Holland. It was while she was en route across the English channel on one of the liners from Rotterdam that the passengers were informed that war had been declared and as a result they were not allowed to land at Tilbury, Eng., for a number of hours.

On reaching London Miss VanWart joined Miss Edna Baird, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Baird of this city and Miss Gladys Grant, daughter of Mr. C. Gordon Grant of Southampton, who had also been studying music in Germany. The three immediately booked passage on one of the liners but the sailing was cancelled on account of the company being informed that several German cruisers were patrolling in the Atlantic. Later the party secured passage in the steerage of the S.S. Athena, which arrived at Quebec on Tuesday.

It was a rough passage across the Atlantic and the young ladies suffered a great deal from sea-sickness. Miss VanWart states that the port holes

MORE SOLDIER BOYS

LEAVE TONIGHT FOR VALCARTIER

One of the Party Made Journey From Cabano by Canoe---Citizens Will Give the Boys a Hearty Send-off

The second detachment of volunteers for overseas service from the 71st Regt. are leaving this evening by L.C.R. for Val Cartier on the 6.30 train and it is expected that a large number of citizens will be at the station to give the boys a hearty send-off.

Acting Color Sergt. Arthur Shalu will be in command of the contingent which consists of twenty-seven non-commissioned officers and men. Col. Sergt. Shalu arrived here last evening from Cabano, Quebec, having made the entire trip by foot and canoe in less than three weeks. He saw active service in the South African campaign as a miner and his father, who was a captain in one of the Imperial regiments, lost his life in one of the engagements during the latter part of the war. Before coming to Canada Color Sergt. Shalu

were masked every night and before sailing the officers in command of the ship had been instructed to give out no information to the passengers regarding the war situation. Many very wealthy people were compelled to take steerage passage on the various liners.


