## Sportsmen Are Skeptical Of Big Paris Fight

PITCHER MARRIED  
TWO HOURS  
AFTER GAME

Walter Johnson Weds Congressman's Daughter After Winning Game-- Romance in Baseball

Washington, June 24--From the pitcher's box Walter P. Johnson, the premier twirler of the Washington baseball team, this evening walked into the home of Congressman E. E. Roberts of Nevada and signed up with Miss Hazel Lee Roberts in the matrimony league. The two had long discussed the terms of a contract and reached an agreement some time ago.

As a small present for his bride Johnson a 2-to-1 game from the world's Champion Athletics, whom he held to four hits in the second frame of a double-header, only two hours before his marriage. Then he changed his uniform for evening dress and hastened to the home of his fiancée at 1498 Monroe St.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. Forrest J. Prettyman, chaplain of the United States Senate in the presence of only intimate friends of the family. In fear that his fellow-players might make a demonstration and the fans embarrass him with congratulations, Johnson endeavored to keep his coming marriage secret, but it leaked out and was lustily celebrated this afternoon by the grandstand and the bleachers.

Even as he toiled through the third inning a friend visited the marriage license office and obtained the license giving the age of the groom as 26 and of the bride as 20 years.

In the wedding came the culmination of a real baseball romance, Johnson having been introduced to Miss Roberts by her father who is one of the greatest fans in the country. For more than a year Miss Roberts has been a most ardent and enthusiastic rooter for the Washington team, and today she cheered the big pitcher to victory in the last game of his bachelorhood.

Mrs. Johnson long has been considered one of the prettiest girls in the Congressional set, and her debut next season was anticipated with great interest.

The honeymoon will be postponed till the close of the season, although Mrs. Johnson probably will accompany her husband on the next swing around the circle, which, however, will not start for a month.

Hold That Seat Sellers and Movie Companies Are at the Bottom of the Contest for a Golden Harvest--Moran's History Does not Show for the Class

New York, June 26--The result of the heavyweight championship fight between Jack Johnson and Frank Moran at Paris tomorrow night will probably be known in this city in the late afternoon. The match has not attracted any great amount of attention here, principally for the reason that it looks "queer" from whatever angle it may be viewed. A succession of contradictory reports concerning the details of the match has floated over from the other side ever since the articles were signed with moving picture accompaniment, etc., last January. The cables have told of the posting of large forfeits and the placing of certified checks for fabulous amounts in bank vaults for safe keeping. Moving pictures have been displayed showing the prospective principals training faithfully for the contest. On the other hand, persons who are in a position to know the inside facts concerning the match declare that the mill is to be staged solely with a view to reaping a golden harvest from the sale of seats and the moving picture privileges. Other sporting men who have returned from Paris recently have stated that neither fighter has made any great pretence of training for the battle.

#### MORAN'S RECORD.

But in the minds of the ring followers the most disagreeable feature of the match is the fact that it appears altogether one-sided. On past performances Gunboat Smith or Tom Langford, instead of Moran, should have had the first chance to tackle Johnson for the championship.

The record of Moran certainly contains no item that would indicate he was made of championship stuff. He began as a professional in 1910, taking part in fifteen mills. He knocked out four rivals, all unknown, and outpointed others of equal insignificance. Incidentally, he met Johnson in a four-round exhibition in Pittsburg and was a toy in the hands of the champion.

In the winter of 1910-11 Moran boxed no decision bouts with Dummy Maxon and Al Falzer in Brooklyn. He beat Moran, but Falzer drew with him. In another Brooklyn bout Jim Savage, a fourth rater, outboxed Moran, who then went to England and France in 1912. On the other side he put away a half dozen or more of the big fellows, but his opponents without exception were little better than amateurs.

When Moran returned here in the summer of 1912 he made a poor showing in a ten-round affair with Al Kubiak. Tom Kennedy, knocked out by Bombardier Wells, held Moran to a ten-round draw in this city, while clumsy Tony Ross got a verdict over him in ten rounds in Cleveland. It took Moran ten rounds to stop Harry Wuest, an unknown, in Columbus, but he went to Juarez, Mexico, after that and knocked out one Dave Willis in eight rounds.

Later in the summer Moran fought Jack Geyer, a fifth rater, in a four-round bout in San Francisco and lost the decision. Then came the match with Gunboat Smith, December 27, 1912, in San Francisco. The Pittsburg adopted the tactics of a marathon runner and the Gunboat was given the decision on points after he had chased his opponent about the ring for the entire twenty rounds.

#### MORAN'S MANOEUVRES.

Moran took part in five battles in 1913. In March he stopped Al McCluskey in five rounds before a local club. He failed to beat Sailor White in six rounds in Philadelphia and when he faced the late Luther McCarty here in April he was decisively beaten in ten rounds. Subsequently Moran knocked out Tim Logan in four rounds at New Orleans and also disposed of Al Falzer in seven at a local club, when it was well known that Falzer's physical condition should have kept him out of the ring. The victory over Falzer formed the basis of Moran's manager proclaiming the Pittsburg as the next champion, but he was careful to sidestep a match with Gunboat Smith, Sam Langford and the other heavies whose records were such as to afford pretty good evidence that they would have little difficulty in disposing of a fighter of Moran's calibre.

Has Fractured Thumb to Boot--Cobb Out of the Game for a Whole Week

Detroit, Mich., June 25--Tyrus Cobb, the widely known baseball player, pleaded guilty in Justice Court today on a charge of disturbing the peace and paid a \$50 fine. Had he not paid the fine he would have had to spend six months in the house of correction.

The charge was made against Cobb by William L. Carpenter, in whose meat shop the ball player caused a disturbance last Saturday night. Cobb and Carpenter had a dispute over the purchase of some fish and when Cobb flourished a revolver Harold Harding an employ, stepped in and a fight ensued. The ball player sustained a fractured thumb which has kept him out of the ball games all this week.

#### WORKING OUT AT HENLEY

Henley on Thames, June 25--Bearing upon Winnipeg's chance for the Grand A significant change has been made in the order of Leaders crew. Oarsman having been deposed from stroke in favor of Dr. I. Day who rowed bow for Cambridge in the university boat race.

The Canadians recorded their fastest time Tuesday evening in a full course row, passing the half way mark in 3 minutes 131 seconds they post which they reached in 7 minutes pushed on vigorously to the winning 14 seconds, rather better than R. C. Bourne, the well known Oxford rowers fastest trail last year.

The crews were out this morning detail work being supplemented by a good two minute row.
