### NEW ISOLATION HOSPITAL FOR FREDERICTON

Joint Committee Meet and Send Deputation to Government--Site on Old Government House Grounds Asked For

Definite steps are at last being taken to secure proper accommodation for isolation cases of contagious disease in Fredericton.

A joint committee comprising members of the Board of Health, City Council and the Hospital Board of trustees in order confer on the matter of a suitable site for an isolation hospital and arrange for the drawing plans and specifications. The City Council will be asked at the next meeting for authority to have plans and specifications drawn up.

The outbreak of measles and scarlet fever in the city last fall has drawn to public notice the great need for immediate provision for emergencies of this kind. The agitation for an isolation hospital started at that time bids fair to materialize in a new public building for Fredericton.

### AT POLICE COURT

Mary Yeomans was before the Police Magistrate on Friday morning, for vagrancy. The police found Mary in her cups along the waterfront last evening and placed her in the cooler over night. The Police Magistrate gave her thirty days at this morning's session.

Frank Henry was charged with assault at Springhill. As no one appeared against him he was remanded until bail could be furnished. The case was adjourned until this afternoon.

### HEBREW BUYERS BROUGHT UP SHORT FOR CRUELTY

Jews Must Treat Cattle Humanely---Case at Spring Hill---Second Complaint Laid Before Police

For the second time complaint was lodged on Thursday evening at the police court against Jewish beef buyers for inhuman treatment of dumb animals. Residents near the C.P.R. station made a similar complaint on Wednesday and last night City Marshal Roberts was called out to Springhill, where Benjamin Budavitch and Ruben Budavitch were on their way to the city with calves and steers for the slaughter-house.

The Yiddish stock-buyers had their wares very wonderfully disposed. Two steers, with their heads in tandem, were being goaded to a trot ahead of the buggy while two calves tied by the legs to the wagon, had their heads shoved under the seat to economize space.

The official from the city directed the owners to loosen the animals and move themselves sufficiently to drive them in human and civilized fashion. Marshal Roberts says that this cruelty must stop or those responsible will receive rough handling.
