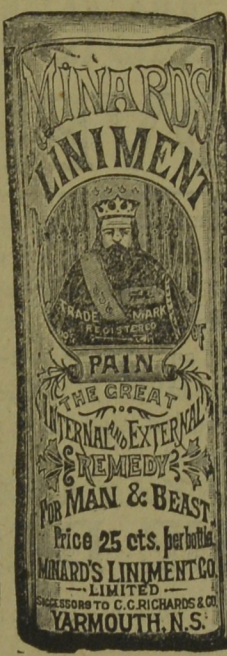

MAN-MADE CIVILIZATION DEPLORED BY MRS. GILMAN

(New York Sun.)

"We have had a masculine civilization throughout the history of the world because men have always monopolized the whole area of human activities," began Mrs. Charlotte Perkins Gilman in the second of her "Studies in Masculism," which she is giving Wednesday mornings in the Hotel Astor. Her topic today was "Our Male Civilization and Its Influence on Women."

"The whole trouble is," continued Mrs. Gilman "that man has always looked on woman not as a human being, but simply as a female, and even today he is still too much inclined to do so. The chief effect of this exclusive masculine culture upon women has been to check their racial development."

Mrs. Gilman then pointed out how women have been looked upon and treated throughout the ages and quoted Herbert Spencer to the effect that in the history of the human race as written the saddest part deals with the treatment of women but the saddest part of the universal brutality shown them has not been written. She also referred frequently to Ward's "Pure Sociology," and to Elsie Clews Patterson's book "The Old Fashioned Women," also to various proverbs showing the very inferior position in which women were held in early times. From the stories of woman's creation from a dog's or monkey's tail down to a German scientist's assertion that "woman is an expression of man's sin," women have been looked down upon.

Men ought not to be sensitive about a bit of criticism when they hear how women have been talked about for centuries. They ought to be patient for hundreds or thousands of years. Men have the right to defend themselves, but it has always been a one-sided affair with women. They have not had means of redress. Even old St. Chrysostom has called them "necessary evils," "desirable afflictions," &c.

The audience was cautioned not to confound the subject of the morning with a criticism of men today. The ancient attitude expressed in such proverbs as "Where there is evil, cherchez la femme," she explained, was not the fault of individual men; there is no culprit to be sought out nor blame to be attached. The business for women today is to get out of such primitive conditions.

"Women do not want to do men's work; they couldn't if they wanted to; they merely want to do human work."

Mrs. Gilman put in a good word for the too-much ridiculed spinster, brought up to consider marriage as the only loop-hole of escape from a scorned condition, yet she must never look or act as though she wanted to attract the attention of man.

All the shame and suffering which women have undergone, Mrs. Gilman accredited to the male civilization, but she offered also to hope that with the progress of the enlightenment of today, with the understanding of the humanness of women, there will come a better civilization for all.

THE MAGICIAN'S WAND.

The Premier was very optimistic in his remarks in introducing the bill.

He had foretold the future with as much earnestness and in as rosy colors as he had two years ago when he reported the contract to the House.

The magician waved his wand, and the provincial liability of \$400,000 a year disappeared from view. The post, with his garland and singing robes about him, sang of the glorious future, and the Legislature joined in the chorus and voted the millions.

In spite of what the Premier had said as to the future of the province, and the rosy picture which he drew of what might be expected in years to come, he (Stewart) felt that he could not follow the Premier in the policy which he proposed to carry out. It was based on calculations not to be realized, and which were transparently incorrect.

The company didn't carry out its obligations beforehand and their promises were worth nothing now.

The contract should be cancelled and the Government should finish the road themselves under men whom they could trust to carry out their directions honestly. Surely three able, honest, experienced men could be found for the work. He regretted that he would have to break away from the leader of the Government on the matter. The province should have the matter in its own hands.

It had to put up the whole of the money to build it, and should, therefore, own it outright. In his opinion the Government could construct the road for considerable less money than the company were doing and when they had built it it would belong to the province.

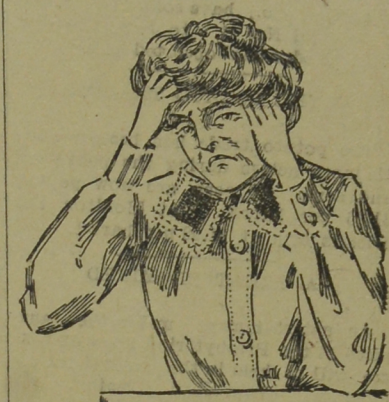

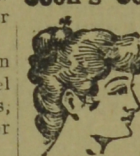
