ed by Sir William MacKenzie.
"The Laurier government secured a first mortgage and you have no particle of a sound security," retorted Hon. Mr. Graham.

ST. JOHN VALLEY BRIDGES BILL

Ottawa, May 19—When the commons met this morning consideration of government bills was proceeded for two hours the resumption of the debate on the C.M.R. resolutions.

Second reading of the St. John Valley Railway bridges bill was moved by Hon. Dr. Reid. The minister explained that it had been arranged for the government to pay interest on a \$1,000,000 on the bridge bonds and the company to build. Now it had been decided that the government would build the three bridges.

Mr. Carvell said he thought that the change was a good one, and that he had something to do with having it brought about. He objected to Section 5 of the bill which declared the act shall come into force "after the passing of such legislation, by the legislature of New Brunswick, as may be deemed necessary in the premises." This provision, said Mr. Carvell, was entirely unnecessary and would mean that the construction of the bridges could not be commenced for a year, as the legislature of New Brunswick had prorogued. He said that the province wanted the construction of the bridges undertaken as soon as possible. It was estimated that the one across the St. John River would cost \$2,000,000. It would take time to complete a structure of that sort and there should not be a year's delay before authority could be obtained to commence it. If the bill passed as it was, four years at least would elapse before the bridges of the Valley Railway could be completed.

Premier Borden said that Mr. Hazen was better informed upon this matter than any other member of the government and as he was engaged with a special committee, it would be well to leave this matter until Mr. Hazen was in the house. The bill stood.

C.N.R. DEBATE.

The debate on the C.N.R. resolutions was resumed by J. H. Burnham of Peterboro, who, while supporting the proposals of the government, was severe in his strictures of MacKenzie & Mann. He said that these gentlemen were being given a little more hope. There was a great danger that they were being given a little more for the express purpose of hanging themselves. There would not be general regret if they succeeded in doing this. If they came back here next year, he said, and if they are not then given a summary foreclosure there will be a riot in this country.

Ernest Lapointe of Kamouaska, said that last year the government had given them \$15,000,000 without making an inquiry at all, and now they were back with a demand for \$45,000,000 more.

Mr. McCrae of Sherbrooke, thought that if gossip was to be believed, the Borden government owed its existence to some extent to MacKenzie & Mann in the last election.

W. F. MacLean of Toronto, who followed, said that if the C.N.R. went to the wall, the credit of Canada would be greatly injured. The agreement did not meet the situation. It was the first practical step towards government ownership, although it was not complete government ownership. The country was in a position where the road might in the future be acquired by the people and linked up with the Intercolonial. He hoped in time the C.N.R. would be owned outright by the country. Carrying out the same policy he would like to see a line of government-owned steamers established on the ocean.

Mr. MacLean predicted that within two years the Grand Trunk Pacific and N.T.R. along with the C.N.R. and the Intercolonial, would be on the government's hands.

A. Verville said it was all a question of juggling with millions. Last year it was \$15,000,000 and this year it was \$45,000,000. This meant \$6 of additional debt obligation for every man, woman and child in the country.

MAN WHO EXPOSED SEA GOLD FRAUD

(Nangor News.)

Prof. Probyn Peacock of Philadelphia, one of the leading chemists in the country is in Portland for a short time. Prof. Peacock is engaged in an exhaustive study of mill waste and is intending to pass most of the coming lumber season among the saw mills on the St. John and St. Croix rivers experimenting on the production of various substances from the slabs edgings and saw dust. He is not prepared to make public the details of his plans and processes. In fact what the processes will be will have to be determined after he reaches the scene of his operations. Prof. Peacock will be remembered as one of the two men who exploded the famous Jernegan salt water gold swindle at North Lubec, eighteen years ago. It will be recalled that the scheme was to use a mysterious electrical process to decompose salt water and to cause the gold to be deposited on an electrode much as is the process of plating substances with gold. Prof. Peacock and his associate determined that there must be some swindle about it as they could not figure how gold could be taken from water unless it was first put in. They did some cal detective work and found that just about the time Jernegan had a demonstration of the working of the gold mine a diver was to be seen going down under water to put some lumps of gold in the box, thus giving good material for the electric current to act upon.

The swindle was exploded by the two men and the bubble burst with a loud explosion.

Prof. Peacock says his scheme to utilize wood waste is different from instead of trying to get something from nothing his idea is to make a great deal of something and get a very little from it. Wood alcohol ethyl spirits, spirits of turpentine, a certain amount of potash creosote and some iodine can be extracted from wood refuse and it is his purpose to see if some thing cannot be brought about to make this possible at a profitable rate.

Prof. Peacock has been in Porto Rico for some time past working with the refuse lot of sugar mills commonly known as bagasse in the effort to make something more valuable than fuel out of it. The stuff comes in the form of fibre more or less sticky and sour and Prof. Peacock thinks he could devise a process for extracting a certain amount of spirits or vinegar from it.

Prof. Peacock says he feels there are just as many grand prizes yet unwon in the field of chemistry as there ever were instancing an artificial rubber or something to take its place a low priced fuel for automobiles and power plants, process of laying paint on vehicles and other fine work in the same general way that metals are plated with gold and silver, and numerous others. Prof. Peacock is himself a fine example of the value of success in the field of chemistry for he has won several large slices of fortune from processes that he has invented.
