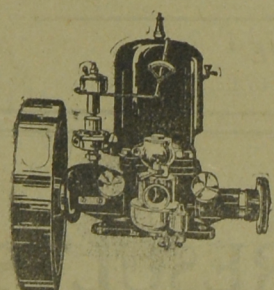

FIVE YANKEE GOLFERS LEFT IN BRITISH MATCHES

Another Succumbed Yesterday in Second Round of Championships--Quimet Will Play Today

Sandwich, England, May 19—Fraser Hale of Chicago was the only American to suffer defeat in the second round of the play for the British amateur golf championships today. Charles W. Evans, Jr., of Chicago, the ex-open western champion; Harold Weber of Toledo, and Arthur C. Lockwood, Belmont Springs, Mass. defeated their opponents.

As Francis Ouimet, open American champion, and Frederick Herreshoff, New York, did not compete today, there still remain five of the ten American entrants to continue the struggle.

Hale was put out by Ivo Whitton, the Australian champion, by four up and three to play.

Ouimet and Herreshoff will play in the second round tomorrow, and if they win they will also play in the third round tomorrow. Evans will meet Scott of Park Langley; Weber will play Carlisle of Sunningdale, and Lockwood will meet Hayling of Ealing. Ouimet and Herreshoff will have as their opponents Tubbs of Little Stone and Platt of the Royal North Devon, respectively.

One of the most interesting matches tomorrow will be that between Harold H. Hilton, the British amateur champion, and Robert Harris, Acton, England, who was runner-up to Hilton for the championship last year.
