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ASQUITH 60 YEARS OLD

London, Sept. 12—The Rt. Hon. Herbert H. Asquith, premier of Great Britain, quietly celebrated his sixtieth birthday anniversary today. During the day he was the recipient of a flood of congratulatory messages from friends and admirers in all parts of the United Kingdom and from Canada, Australia and other of the overseas dominions.

HON. SYDNEY FISHER SCORES THE GOVERNMENT

Potten Springs, Que., Sept. 9—Many were the attacks on Canada's government made at a luncheon given here on Saturday to the Hon. Sydney Fisher, by the Liberal Association of the County of Brome.

With considerable vehemence Mr. Fisher hit out, time and time again, at the new government. The people of the Dominion had been caught napping at the last elections, he declared. Annexation was now more a menace than it would ever have been had reciprocity been accepted. He affirmed also that the naval question will result in the downfall of the honorable gentleman now looking after Canada's interest, and that the Conservative party had never intended to live and was not living up to its election promises.

Mr. Borden had found, he proceeded, that the navy question was a more difficult one to settle than he had ever anticipated. When in England he (Mr. Borden) had refused to make any statement on the naval question, because "he must first consult the people of Canada." When in Canada, previous to his trip to England, he had refused to make any definite announcement because he had "first to consult the imperial parliament."

A change of feeling was, Mr. Fisher considered, proved by the provincial elections of last May; and that change of feeling would be made more prominent, he considered, at the next federal elections, which he anticipated could not be very far distant.

"We were defeated last fall on a great public question," said the speaker. "The people of Canada voted on a wave of public feeling, against the people to the south of us, not on careful consideration of a great question from an economic standpoint."

"In the campaign I warned people that a refusal of this great business opportunity, reciprocity, might result in a cleavage of the east and the west. It has done so, and the people of the west may, some day, become so determined to have a better market for all their produce that, unable to obtain reciprocity in the manner it was offered us, they will get it by annexation. Canada, by the refusal of reciprocity, has been turned into two hostile camps."

"Toryism," said Mr. Fisher, turning to a new subject, "has ever been embodied in a few people anxious to manage a country for their own personal good."

Mr. Monk and Mr. Borden, he went on, could not carry out their election promises without offending each other. This he thought was decidedly immoral and improper.

SAYS CIVIL SERVICE REFORM IS DELAYED.

The speaker dwelt at some length on the policies of the Liberal party, which he outlined to his hearers.

"We Liberals," he said, "opened in August, 1911, a civil service reform by which part of the Civil Service was open to those who, on consideration of the results of their examinations, best deserved it. At the time that we introduced that law, I was honored by my chieftain in being chosen to frame it. We made it to apply to inside service; Mr. Borden and Mr. G. E. Foster said that we should have made it apply to all departments."

"Since the time of the elections Mr. Borden has not taken one step to favor this reform, as he said that he would. He asked us to make it apply to all departments, and he now makes it apply to none."

"He has, however, bestowed much patronage and dismissed many faithful servants in the Civil Service. I

make this charge publicly and I think that this is a fair specimen of his public capacity."

"We Liberals as a party, were defeated in Canada. I want to congratulate the Liberals on the manner in which they took their defeat."

"You men were caught napping last fall, but you woke up in the provincial elections of last May and elected Mr. Vilas in this county by more than 400 majority. My defeats have been accidents and I appeal to you to repair this last one."

The railway service in that part of the country, Mr. Fisher pointed out, had been obtained by the Liberals. It was claimed by the Conservatives in one election in that district, he said, that they, and they only, could obtain the railway service. On this plea, Conservatives went to the federal House, but the service was not obtained until some years later, when the Liberal party went into power.

The Hon. Mr. Fisher concluded by declaring that the party was still fortunate in having Sir Wilfrid Laurier as a leader.

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BARBARA FRIETCHE ANNIVERSARY

Frederick, Md., Sept. 12—Today marked the semi-centennial anniversary of the entry of the Confederates into Frederick City, when occurred the incident of Barbara Frietche and the flag as related in Whittier's immortal poem. Though some later historians have been inclined to doubt the truth of the poet's story the main fact as to Dame Barbara's patriotism was long ago established. The local patriotic societies are now engaged in raising funds for a monument to Mrs. Frietche, who died within a few months after the event which made her famous.

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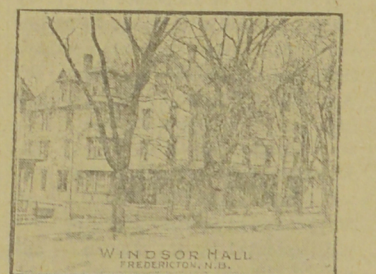
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
