ALLIE W. BROKE  
HER NECK THURSDAY  
ON HALIFAX TRACK

Driver Rockford Suspended as Result  
of Accident—Premier and Minnie  
in Mixup—Good Racing

Halifax, Sept. 12—There was good  
racing on at the opening of the ex-  
hibition meeting today. The 2.17  
class was not finished. In the 2.40  
class Montrose won first money,  
Redwing second and Signor third. In  
the first heat of the 2.17 class  
Premier, driven by Leonard, collided  
with Minnie driven by Frank Bou-  
tillier, of Halifax. Minnie's driver  
was thrown and a wheel of the bike  
was taken off. Minnie dropped to the  
rear when this happened but im-  
mediately started running, passed the  
field, went twice around the half mile  
course, passed the wire ahead and  
went into her stable.

In the second heat of the same race  
Axwell driven by S. A. Rockford of  
Fredericton went to a break, collided  
with Allie W., the latter turning a  
somersault, breaking her neck throw-  
ing Frank Adams, who was not seri-  
ously hurt. The judges declared that  
Rockford was at fault and he was  
suspended for the rest of the season  
the horse being ruled out of the race.  
Rockford had been suspended on  
October 29, 1910 and had only just

IMPORTANT RULING

Cincinnati, Sept. 11—The national  
baseball Commission today ruled that  
a clause in the constitution of a minor  
league prohibiting the acceptance  
by one of its clubs of a player under  
an optional agreement is in con-  
flict with the revised National agree-  
ment and therefore, null and void.

A minor league club may, however,  
for business reasons, decline to enter  
into an option agreement with a  
major league club or a minor league  
club of higher classification, but the  
privilege to do so cannot be restricted  
or nullified by legislation of the  
league.

The ruling was made by the com-  
mission on requests from the presi-  
dent of the Connecticut State League  
and several other minor league ex-  
ecutives.

Fredericton, winners of the N. B.  
& Maine League got away with the  
Lynn New England League team to  
the tune of 9 to 6 yesterday at  
Scully's Grove. The game was not  
so good as some of the league games  
which have been seen here during  
the season. Both teams had lots of  
errors and both pitchers were batted  
hard. Hughes and Joe Neptune of  
the Houlton Reds figured in the Lynn  
line-up and Charley Martini of Houl-  
ton played second base for Frederic-  
ton. Hughes and Neptune were not  
in their usual form but Martini played  
good ball. In the Fredericton in-  
field, "Red" Wildes and Bob Conley  
were also off color.

for the home club and pitched good  
ball. A peculiar feature of the game  
was the fact that the only player  
hit by a pitched ball was his own  
brother Bill Harrington who played  
in the Lynn outfield. Harrington

for the Fredericton batters to solve.  
George Finamore took the thank-  
less task of umpire and received  
knocks from both players and specta-  
tors.

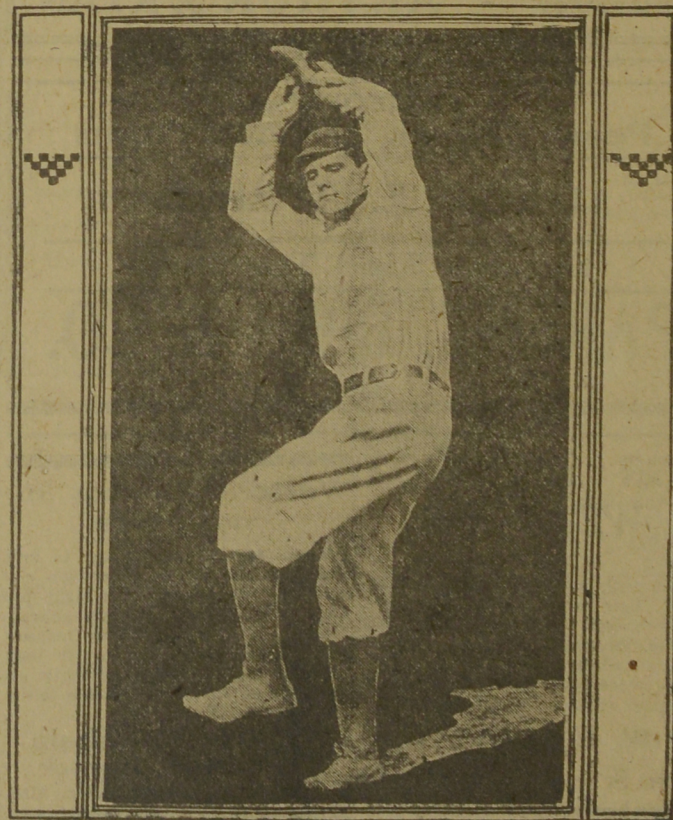
