**PROUDER IN DEFEAT
THAN IN VICTORY**

(Toronto Globe.)

Every true and intelligent Liberal in Canada will endorse Sir Wilfrid Laurier's straight words: "We are prouder of our defeat than our opponents are of their victory." In that pride self-respecting Liberals in all parts of Canada unreservedly join. The defeat of the Liberal policy of larger markets for the products of Canada and freer trade in the foodstuffs of the people instead of bringing discouragement either to the great Liberal leader or to the rank and file of the Liberal party marks a new epoch in the life of Liberalism in Canada. Regrets among Liberals are not for their party, but for their country. Canada is by so much the poorer, the more straitened in its development, because of the defeat of a trade policy desired by both parties for a half century and needed today as never before in Canada's history. To have stood firm for that policy at larger markets and freer foodstuffs is to the credit of the Liberal party. To have taken defeat more proudly than his opponents have taken victory is to the honor of the Liberal chief. In such defeat is neither dishonor nor disheartenment. The men of principles, and convictions, and devotion to Canada's high destiny rise with renewed vigor. They know that time is on their side. One short twelvemonth has already justified their policy. Food taxes, the resentment of those who were duped by false cries, the race-and-creed chickens that are coming home to roost, the reaction of the campaign waged last year by the allied American and Canadian trusts, the evasion of great national obligations, and the unsolved problem of markets for Canada's natural products—these things abide, and their presence are the flies in the ointment of the men who won a victory at the cost of principle. But Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberals will never regret the seeming defeat of last year. Had they kept office by the denial of Liberalism's policy the world over the Liberalism of Canada would have been dishonored. But now we are all prouder of our defeat than any hypocritical and patriotic man would be of the victory of our opponents.

FARMERS SHOULD KEEP CLEAN FARMS.

After recent observations in the United Kingdom, and also in France, Switzerland, Germany and Denmark—and to enable me to get more complete and useful knowledge of the rural conditions in these countries, I travelled by road over 3,000 miles in June, July and August—I was very much impressed with the notable differences between the appearance of the farm fields in Europe and in Canada. A real woody farm, with the exception of one limited area in Bavaria, was an uncommon spectacle. On the other hand, if you take the train from Ottawa to Montreal, or from any other centre in Canada for a distance of fifty or a hundred miles, to see reasonably clean farms or fields, that seem so to your eyes from the windows of the railway car, is the exception rather than the rule. I make this point now; in those countries and on those lands where weeds are kept in check or are becoming less harmful, some systematic rotation of crops is the common practice; and in our country where weeds are increasing in the most alarming way, a systematic rotation of crops is the exception—amounting to only 9 per cent. of the 985 farms visited in 1910. The survey in 1910 brought out this conviction from the summing up of the information obtained; that if farmers on the average had carried on their work according to the systems and methods followed by 50 of the best farmers whose farms were examined, they would have doubled the output of their crops from the same area. That is one of the convictions leading to hope, from the survey in 1910—Dr. Robertson before the Committee of Agriculture and Colonization.

THE NAVAL QUESTION

"In a country like this events move rapidly, and the man at the head of affairs sometimes has to act quickly, to take risks if he would do his duty for the safety of his country. In Quebec it is easy to talk of the utility of a navy. But Canada is not comprised of Quebec alone. There is British Columbia at one end of the Dominion and the Maritime Provinces at the other. Should a country like Canada, with the coast line Canada has, remain absolutely without protection? Those who say so are simply demagogues. "The question is one which must be settled. We solved it in a manner which we believed was our best duty to Canada and to the Empire. It is easy to inspire terror among the people. But I would rather have been beaten than to have won by such means.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier at Mariville.

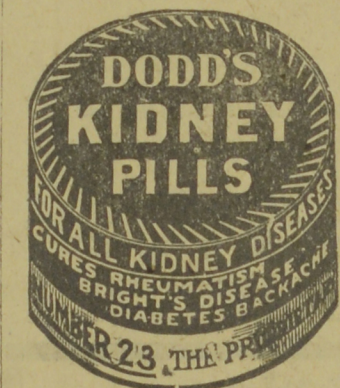
