## PRISONER'S DISCHARGE ORDERED.

In Supreme Court chambers before His Honor Mr. Justice Landry, application was made Thursday afternoon on behalf of Samuel Frenette, a prisoner in the common goal of Restigouche, under commitment for selling liquor without a license, for his discharge on habeas corpus. Several grounds were urged attacking the legality of the arrest and the imprisonment of the applicant. The prisoner was imprisoned on August 1st last. After hearing argument of counsel on both sides, His Honor granted the order discharging Frenette from imprisonment. Arthur T. Leblanc, barrister of Campbellton, supported the application on behalf of Frenette, and P. A. Guthrie of Crocket & Guthrie, appeared on behalf of the liquor license inspector.

## ANOTHER NEW INDUSTRY FOR CITY IS CONTEMPLATED

Project on Foot for Construction of Large and Modern Tannery Near the C. P. R. Station--To Manufacture High Grade Leather

## BOTH LOCAL AND OUTSIDE MEN ARE INTERESTED

It is understood that there is a movement on foot to further augment Fredericton's factory district near the C. P. R. station. The industry which it is proposed to establish is a tannery for the manufacture of leather of the highest grade. In past years Fredericton had several tanneries which turned out leather of various grades and which afforded employment to large numbers of men. The development of the tanning industry in other parts of Canada and the tendency toward consolidation gradually forced the smaller local industries out of the field. It is thought, however, that there are now signs of change in conditions which would very much favor the re-establishment of a tannery in Fredericton.

The project has been talked over and it is probable that with the completion of the two new factory buildings now under construction near the C.P.R. station that it will take definite shape. The proposal is to use a site to the east of that on which the Palmer-McLellan factory is being built. The tannery if present plans are carried out would be fully equipped with modern machinery and would be as large as the Palmer-McLellan building. Both local and outside men are said to be interested in this matter.

## PRESENTATION OF SHIELDS

The presentation of the Nelson Shields to the Universities and other educational institutions of the province which is to be made in this city is to take place at 8 p. m. on Tuesday next. The presentation will be made in the auditorium of the Provincial Normal School building. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor is to be present.

## MILK-SUPPLY OF CITY FOUND TO BE OF FIRST RATE QUALITY

Tests Conducted Under Direction of Board of Health Proved Highly Gratifying--Water not Found in Milk

## TO ENFORCE BY-LAW RE INSPECTION OF CATTLE

The matter of the enforcement of the bylaw with regard to the veterinary inspection of dairy-cattle from which the city's milk supply is derived, will probably be considered by the Board of Health at a meeting to be held early next week. At the request of the milk dealers the provisions of the bylaw which went into effect June 1st last, were not enforced as it was urged that the inoculation of cattle for a tuberculosis test during the hot weather of the summer would be injurious to both milk and cattle. Steps will be taken it is likely, to have the herds from which milk dealers get their supply tested during the autumn.

## SATISFACTORY TEST.

During the summer a very satisfactory test of the milk supply of the city was carried out. Contrary to statements which had been made quite generally the milk used by consumers in Fredericton was found to be of a very high average quality, considerable above the standard for milk. There were isolated cases of the milk not being of the best quality but as a whole the milk supply according to the test, is of first-rate quality with no water mixed with it.
