MONTHLY MEETING OF THE HOSPITAL TRUSTEES

Business Transacted was Chiefly of a Routine Nature--No Report to be Published This Year--Five Deaths in August

The business transacted last evening by the hospital trustees, was largely of a routine character. President McMurray occupied the chair, and among the others in attendance were vice-president Clark, Dr. Mullin, Mr. A. R. Slipp and the secretary-treasurer.

Mr. Sampson submitted a statement of finances to date, and the accounts presented, and which were ordered paid, covered some 14g bills including the season's supply of coal. In the report of the Matron it was shown that forty-seven patients were treated in August, and that five deaths occurred. As usual, surgical cases were dominant. Mr. Kelley, who might almost be named Dean of the Institution, has been in poor health for some time, and is undergoing a month's rest.

Some dissatisfaction has been expressed on several occasions over accident patients being brought to the hospital from some of the Minto coal mines without the customary formality, thus placing the Trustees at great disadvantage when trying to find somebody responsible for expense in such cases. The principal Minto Company evidently has no desire to hamper the Trustees, and at yesterday's meeting Mr. R. B. Hanson, of the firm of Sapp & Hanson, submitted a proposition from the Minto Coal Company offering a lump sum for yearly treatment of accident cases from that Company's employees. After Mr. Hanson fully explained the proposition it seemed to be acceptable to the Trustees, but

HAD HOME BUR- GALIZED WHILE VISITING HERE

Former Fredericton Resident the Victim of a Robbery in Boston--Shooting of Woman Results in Gang Being Located

The fact that Mrs. Catherine Bernard, who was shot through the hand and cheek by James DeMarce at 7 Common Street, Boston, a few days ago, wore a suit which she had stolen from the residence of Mrs. Daniel Veasey, formerly Miss Minnie DeLong of this city, has resulted in disclosing the persons who have been committing numerous thefts at that place for some time past.

Mrs. Veasey's residence at 28 West Dedham street was burglarized while she was visiting relatives in this city, and on her return to Boston she immediately had the police investigate the thief.

The shooting of Mrs. Bernard had the result of disclosing the guilty parties' identity and since then charges of breaking and entering the houses of Benjamin E. Jones, 38 Oorhampton Street, Louis A. Brooks 3 Wilkes Street, and a store at 13 Shawmut Avenue, have been preferred against James DeMarce, John Galvin, Alias Rogers and Bessie DeRoche. DeMarce is held under \$4000 bonds, Galvin under \$3000 bonds and the DeRoche girl under \$400 bonds. The DeRoche girl is also charged with being idle and disorderly.
