## HON. DR. PUGSLEY

(Continued From Page 1.)

MacDonald of Picton, they were get-  
ting but one-eleventh, since the rail-  
way had issued \$7,000,000 more stock  
immediately.

He criticized the government's at-  
tempt to take credit for the routing  
of traffic over the C.N.R. to Canadian  
points and thought it was a danger-  
ous provision by which the C.N.R.  
was given the right to define over  
what portions of the government  
railways they could get running  
rights.

MACDONALD CATCHES WHITE.

Hon. W. T. White explained that  
he had not been in the house when  
Mr. MacDonald had made statements  
in this regard.

Mr. MacDonald replied that he  
thought the minister "did protest  
too much." He had evidently never  
taken the trouble to find out what  
the authorized capital stock of the  
C.N.R. had been and had thus been  
guilty of positively misled the house.

In reply to a query by Mr. Boivin  
of Shefford, as to what part of the  
\$45,000,000 guarantee would be used  
for new construction and what part  
employed to pay off the debt amount-  
ing to \$21,000,000, Mr. Meighen said  
that all the debts would certainly be  
paid before the \$45,000,000 was ex-  
pended. If they were not paid out of  
the \$45,000,000 of new guarantee they  
would be paid out of the \$58,000,000  
guarantee still unearned.

SHOULD USE PERSONAL ASSETS

Mr. Pugsley contended that Mac-  
Kenzie & Mann should put up their  
personal assets as security. He had  
information from the best sources  
that these two men were "rich be-  
yond the dreams of avarice." Why  
should they not put up their assets,  
inasmuch as if the sixty per cent. of  
the common stock they held reached  
par as a result of government assist-  
ance they would realize immense  
sums thereby. Mr. Pugsley thought  
that the government auditors had  
apparently been told to be careful  
not to inquire into the other assets  
of these two men.

The prime minister replied empha-  
tically that no such instructions had  
been issued and the statement of Mr.  
Pugsley was entirely unwarranted.  
He pointed out that the Liberal  
government had not requested Mac-  
Kenzie & Mann to put up their assets  
in 1911 when they had guaranteed the  
bonds of the Canadian Northern  
Railway. Would securities issued  
then without the backing of the gov-  
ernment have been of any value?" he  
asked.

Mr. Pugsley's reply was that he  
had not considered the matter at  
that time.

"That is the difference between the  
two governments," said Mr. Borden.  
This government had considered the  
question. Mr. Borden said that the  
late government had failed in 1911  
to secure the safeguards which they  
demanded now and he was not dis-  
posed to attach much importance to  
their representations.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier maintained  
that in 1911 his government had ob-  
tained a first mortgage when the  
Canadian Northern was in good  
standing and that since the road was  
not now in good standing the present  
application should receive different  
treatment.

The premier's reply was that under  
Liberal government MacKenzie &  
Mann had been allowed to so conduct  
their affairs as to build up a claim  
for \$25,000,000 against the C.N.R.,  
every dollar of which claim the pre-  
sent administration had been called  
on them to release, as well as ac-  
quiring two-fifths of the common  
stock.

Resuming the debate after the ev-  
ening recess, Mr. Pugsley asked whether  
the mortgage included the Model  
City in Montreal.

Mr. Meighen said that he would  
bring it under the mortgage, if Mr.  
Pugsley could show that MacKenzie  
& Mann owned that townsite under  
any name, but Mr. Pugsley's reply  
was that this was the duty of the  
government, not the opposition.

W. F. Carroll of Cape Breton, asked  
whether any arrangements had  
been made to have Sydney made a  
port of call for C.N.R. steamers.

Mr. Borden replied that he had al-  
ready been asked in regard to this,  
but he considered this was neither  
the time nor the place to give an answer.

The house adjourned at eleven  
o'clock without any clauses of the  
resolutions having been passed.

THE VALLEY RAILWAY.

According to The Woodstock Press,  
the work on the Valley Railway from  
The Barony to Andover is being  
pushed rapidly along, with about nine  
hundred men employed by the con-  
tractors, Messrs. Kennedy & McDon-  
ald. A new steam shovel at a cost  
of \$13,000, has been purchased and is  
now in use. It is capable of shifting  
4,000 cubic yards of material in ten  
hours. Three trains are at present  
employed in hauling material away  
from it to the dump where the line  
crosses the C.P.R. This it is expected  
to have filled in today. After this  
has been done ballasting from Wood-  
stock to the Barony, a distance of  
about thirty miles, will be started.

## WANT C. T. A. BETTER ENFORCED IN SUNBURY

County Lodges, I. O. G. T. Discussed  
Matter at Quarterly Session  
Yesterday

The York and Sunbury Counties  
District Lodge, I.O.G.T., met in  
quarterly session yesterday afternoon  
in this city with the district chief  
templar, H. T. Brewer, presiding.

Delegates were present from lodges  
at Oromocto, Nasonworth, Frederic-  
ton Junction, Patterson Settlement  
and Fredericton. The Credential  
Committee reported that reports had  
been received from five lodges which

No returns were on hand from one

and the prospects for the future are
