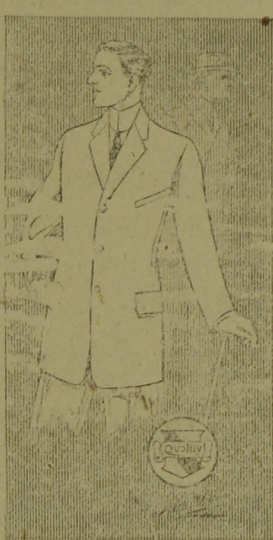

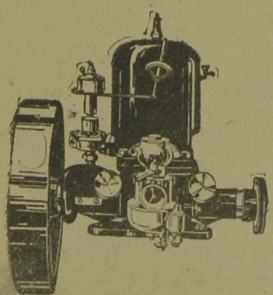

QUIMET PROVED VERY WEAK, OUT IN THIRD ROUND

Americans Disheartened by Showing Made by Golfers--Herreshoff Now Principal Hope of Yankee Party

Sandwich, England, May 20--Francis Ouimet of Massachusetts, open golf champion of the United States, was defeated in the close of the second round of the British amateur golf championship by young Tubbs of Littlestone, by two up.

Frederick Herreshoff of New York, beat J. R. Platt of the Royal North Devon Golf Club by four up and three to play, in the third round.

The third day's play brought together a bigger crowd of spectators than ever, owing to the open character of the competition. A large gallery followed the match between Ouimet and Mr. Tubbs, a very youthful local player from Littlestone-on-Sea, Kent.

Enthusiasm of Americans among spectators was soon sharply cooled by the way in which Tubbs handled their favorite. By the time the two reached the turn Ouimet was one down and Tubbs finished the round with two up and one to play.

The defeat of Ouimet in the closing proved as great a sensation as had that of Jerome D. Travers, American amateur champion. It had been thought that Ouimet would have no difficulty in disposing of the comparatively unknown and youthful Tubbs, who is a steady golfer but never heretofore had succeeded in reaching anything like champion form.

On the links reports were current today that a wager of \$15,000 to \$50,000 had been laid on Monday against either Travers or Ouimet carrying off the championship and had been eagerly taken by some on who favored the American chances.

After his defeat Ouimet was the first to congratulate his opponent. As soon as the last stroke had been played, he shook the Englishman's hand with great cordiality.

Ouimet's weakness on green proved his undoing in today's match. He on several occasions was short of the hole but also occasionally over-ran it. Sometimes he missed easy puts and at the last he usually failed to get down a three-foot put.

Local Baseball Will be Enough for Fans of Up-River Town--Poor Prospect

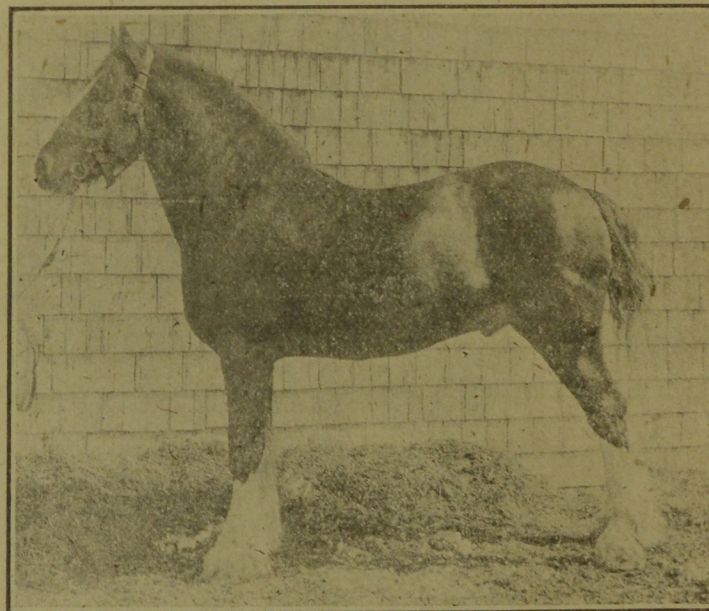
Woodstock, N.B., May 20--From appearances, Woodstock will not put a team into the Provincial Baseball League. A meeting was called tonight to take some action in the matter and only a few attended. The local teams are composed of railway employees, bank clerks and others whose occupation will not permit of their playing away from home. There will be three town teams, and evening games will be played during the season, with teams from nearby towns. This program was carried out last year with great success, exciting games being played with Houlton, McAdam, Mars Hill and other teams.

JUMPERS BARRED FROM INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE

New York, May 20--According to announcement made by President Edward Barrow of the International League, players of that organization who violated their contracts by jumping to the Federal League, will not be permitted to return to the International League under any circumstances. President Barrow stated that the case of Pitcher Frank Smith, who deserted the Montreal team of the International League for the Baltimore Federals, was the case of the International League for the Baltimore Federals and returned to the Montreal club on Sunday, was a point. It was decided that Smith having violated his contract with the Montreal club, could not return and play with the International League despite the fact that he reported back to Montreal of his own free will.

The same ruling was made upon the case of Pitcher Allen of the Baltimore Federals, who came to Montreal with Smith. Allen, previous to his signing with Baltimore, was not a member of any club recognized by organized baseball.
