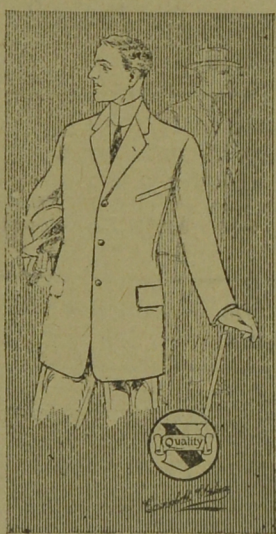

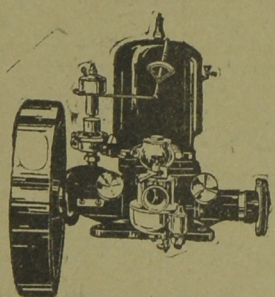

DEL GAINER SOLD TO BOSTON RED SOX FOR \$7,500

George Burns Takes His Place at First Base For Tigers--Has a Record

Washington, D.C., May 27--Delas C. Gainer, substitute first baseman of the Detroit Tigers, has been sold to the Boston Red Sox and will leave at once for Boston to join his new club. Gainer was purchased outright and while the price has not been made public it is believed to be in the neighborhood of \$7,500 as it is known that Jennings refused an offer of \$5,000 when the Tigers were in Boston last week.

Gainer made a wonderful record in his first major league year but his hitting ability suffered severely when he was hit in the wrist in 1912 by Jack Coombs and had a bone fractured. The showing now being made by George Burns, the Tiger recruit first baseman, convinced Jennings that he could dispose of Gainer without weakening the Tiger line-up.

SMITH AND ALLEN FINED FOR JUMPING FEDS

Baltimore, Md., May 23--At a special meeting here today of the Federal League, punishment was meted out to Pitchers Frank Smith and John M. Allen, who deserted the Baltimore club and attempted to join the Montreal club of the International League.

Smith was fined \$100 and suspended for forty-five days. Allen was fined \$50 and suspended for fifteen days. Manager Knabe of the local club, refused an offer of the Brooklyn management for Smith, saying that the player must remain a member of the local club.

LEVINSKY AND DILLON AGAIN

Indianapolis, Ind., May 28--Local fight fans and the hundreds of visiting sporting enthusiasts here for Saturday's great automobile race, are to be treated to a rare dish on the pugilistic menu at Federal Park tomorrow night, when Battling Levinsky, the Philadelphia lightweight, and Jack Dillon of this city come together for a ten-round contest. It will be the second time that these two crack lightweights have faced one another in the ring. Their first meeting took place in Butte, Mont., and resulted in the decision going to Dillon after a hard fought bout. It was the first serious setback that Levinsky has received in his brilliant dash for the top of the pugilistic ladder. Since then the Philadelphia has been anxious to retrieve his reputation and when the match between Gus Christie and Dillon fell through because of a difference over the weight question Levinsky jumped at the chance to take Christie's place as Dillon's opponent. Dillon won the Butte decision by a very narrow margin and the bout from start to finish indicated that the two lightweights are very evenly matched. Levinsky claimed that he was handicapped by not being used to the high altitude of Butte. Under more favorable conditions he believes that he will be able to prove his superiority over the Indianapolis fighter.

IMPERIALS AND FEDS TIED WHEN GAME WAS CALLED

There were four and a half innings of ragged baseball by the Imperials and Federals at the College Field last night and when the umpires called the game on account of darkness the score was 12 to 12. The game is to be replayed. The game was late in starting, largely on account of a wrangle over the umpire. Art Finnamore offered to go in and officiate for nothing but his services were not accepted and Tom Coward worked on the bases and Royden Barbour on balls and strikes. Both teams shifted players. The Imperials, on account of the absence of Clark and McLean, their first-string battery, were weaker than ordinary but nevertheless, batted hard. "Pat" Clark appeared on the scene late but when he tried to go in the box he was protested because he was not in uniform. He wore an Imperial shirt all night but his nether limbs were clad in an ordinary pair of trousers and the protest stood.

Myhrall pitched one inning for the Imps and was replaced by Byron Burden. Wilson, formerly of the R.C.B., started in the game for the Federals. He had lots of speed but not much else and was taken out in the third, Jack Feeney finishing the game. All pitchers were batted hard. Wilson was sent to right field and there pulled off a great one-handed catch of a long fly by George Wandless. This was one of the features of a pretty ragged game.

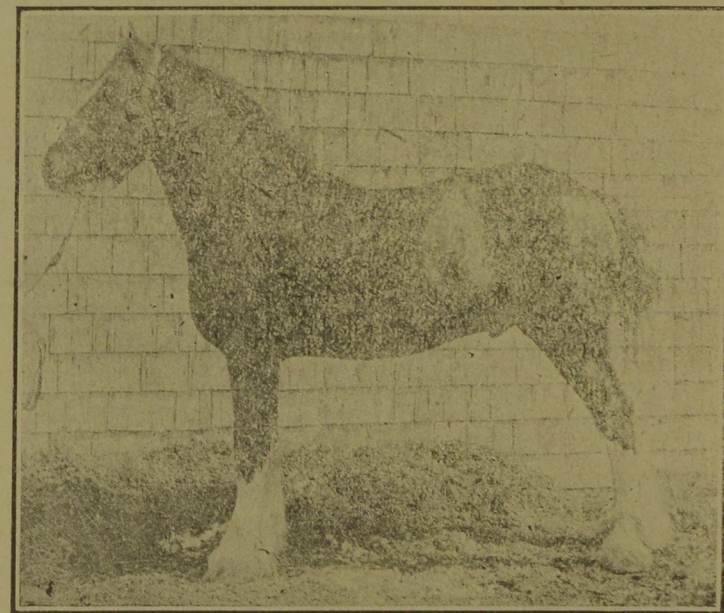
