CRIME MOVIE GREATEST EVIL, SAYS PINKERTON

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 22—Moving pictures are among the greatest and most insidious suggestors of evil in the country, so William A. Pinkerton Detective Agency, told the convention of police chiefs in its sessions here recently. He said that hardly a day passes that he does not read of the practical effect of filling a boy's mind with crime and says that pictures of safe blowers, robbers and holdups should be forbidden by law.

He said that he had only recently turned down offers from moving picture concerns to take part in running down a gang of film bank robbers, and to superintend the staging of the life of Adam Worth, the famous international crook who stole the Gainsborough.

"Within the province of the moving picture lies a dangerous power for evil that cannot be too seriously considered. A written story of crime and human frailty may pass from memory but a pictured delineation is apt to remain. Take a serial picture of sordid crime, like those that illustrate the shocking features of white slavery, drug depravity and gunmen gangs. What good purpose can any normal person expect them to serve? To the rough and weak and ignorant it is like throwing more fuel upon a fire already hard to control.

"There are those afield today in this inviting business who ought to be brought to book bluntly for their sins on this score.

"The motion picture is now and will become more so, one of the greatest educational factors in modern life. The forbidding scenes of the underworld are the snakes in the grass that should be scotched and crushed for the general good of a most worthy business as well as the protection of the world at large."

STOCK MARKET HAS A STRONG UNDERTONE

New York, June 23—The market opening was active and prices were lower all around.

While the volume of activity in the first half hour was not large, stocks seemed to possess a good undertone and there was evidence of accumulation on the little recessions. In conservative quarters it was argued that the decision in the inter-Mountain case was a natural development of a necessary enlargement of powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission which the Supreme Court has set above the powers of the individual states. Union Pacific seemed to be well bought under 165 and there was bullish sentiment on Steel on the ground that the company would receive large orders following the announcement of the rate decision.

THE MONTREAL MARKET.

Montreal, Q., June 23—The market was dull and heavy this morning, with prices showing losses of from stout fractions to a point or more. N.S. Steel was the heaviest feature of the morning, opening at 53 and selling down to 5 with apparently little effort and nothing to account for it. Textile was weak at opening, around 67, but strengthened up a little, closing at 67 1/2. Power was steady and dull at 22 1/2. Brazilian was weak around 78, coming over from London at 77 1/2. Toronto Rails acted erratic at opening, from 129 to 128, but closed steady at 129 1/2. R. & O. sold at 86 1/2, while S. & S. was well taken around 13 1/2. Crown Reserve was very active and steady at 103.

MR. SLIPP'S ADDRESS

The full account of the address of Mr. A. R. Slipp, K.C., to the presiding judge was as follows:

It is the wish of the members of the Fredericton Bar and, if I may be permitted, this community, that you may long be spared in your present position to discharge the duties for which you have proved yourself so eminently fitted.

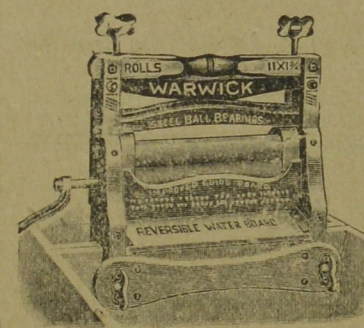
