RED SOX GOT SIXTY-THREE HITS LAST WEEK

Had A Good Margin on Their Opponents—Best Outfield Plus Their Third Sacker Doing Heavy Work—Braves Show Their Finest Batting of the Season

Although the Boston Red Sox won a bare majority of their games last week—four of the seven played—they out-batted, out-fielded, out-pitched and out-scored their opponents in a much more decisive ratio in the four games that the Boston men won, for instance, only one run was made against them and only thirteen of their opponents scored in the entire week, whereas the Red Sox exactly doubled that total, crossing the plate twenty-six times.

Inasmuch as Boston scored twenty-six runs last week and made sixty-three hits, it will be seen that this quartet accomplished somewhat more than half of the run getting and the swatting, the four tallying fourteen times and getting thirty-eight hits.

Yerkes was the only other one of the everyday players who improved in his batting to any marked extent. Steve's seven hits being good for a percentage of .292 for the week.

Speaker and Lewis are running a close race for the stolen base record among the Red Sox, Tris having fifteen steals to his credit up to the end of the week and "Duffy" being credited with fourteen. Scott is the leading sacrifice hitter of the team, his total being fifteen. Lewis and Yerkes come next with ten apiece.

The Braves last week won five of their seven games from the Cubs and Cardinals, their record against the Western teams—with the 2-2 showing against the Reds and 4-0 against Pittsburgh—being eleven games won and only four lost since they returned home.

TY COBB TAKES THE LEAD IN BATTING

Detroit "C" Men Doing Their Share in the American—Dalton the National League Real Leader

It is the same old crowd of pitcher-punishers who make up the .400-or-better list in the American League this week, none of those who were in it a week ago having dropped out and no new ones having earned their way into its membership. The list has a new leader, however, Ty Cobb of the Tigers, now showing the way. Two others of the Detroit "C" men, Coleskie and Crawford, help give Jennings a three-eighths interest in the entire list, for there are eight in all.

Clarence Walker of the St. Louis Browns, is holding his end up, being next to Cobb among the regular players, although getting only four hits last week, a fact chiefly due to the excellence of the Red Sox' pitching in St. Louis.

MATHEWSON AT THE HEAD.

Christy Mathewson at last has come into his own as the leading National League pitcher, not only as a regular turn-taker, but as the leader of all-comers. He has won nine games, losing only two, and seems to have come back after showing slight signs of not being right up to his form of a season ago.

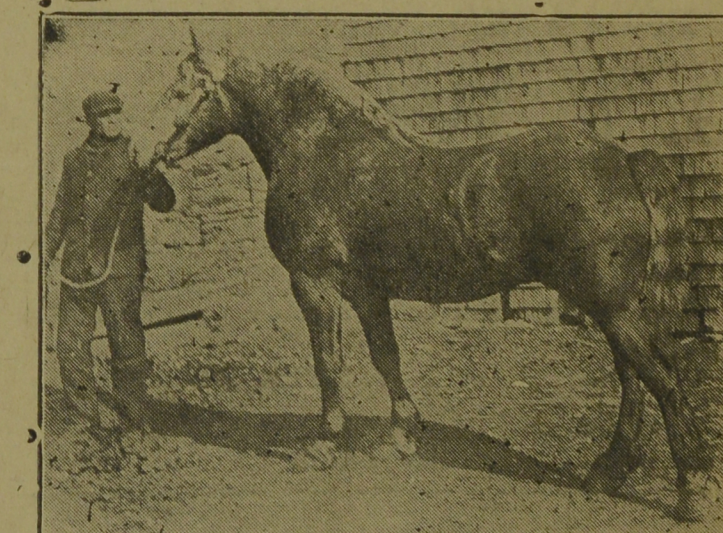
