MAY DEMAND RESIGNATION OF PREMIER FLEMMING

Graft Revelations Were Discussed at a Meeting of the Executive Last Evening--Strong Language Said To Have Been Used

The local government met here last evening and was in session until nearly midnight. Some routine business was transacted, a delegation was heard and the balance of the time was taken up with a discussion of the shocking revelations of graft and political debauchery made before the royal commission at St. John. There is a report in circulation today that the government, as a result of the disclosures, has decided to at once demand the resignation of Premier Flemming. The allegation that the fund collected by Mr. Berry was for political purposes is looked upon by the members of the executive as a little scheme to drag them into the affair and to shield Flemming, and they do not propose to stand for it. The fact that there has been no election since the fund was collected, scarcely bears out the political fund theory. It is said that some plain talk was indulged in by at least one member of the executive last night, and Premier Flemming's ears must have tingled. This member is quoted as declaring that he had a suspicion that this stealing was going on for months and although he tried to do so, he was powerless to stop it.

The executive heard a delegation from the Board of Health last evening composed of Messrs. J. F. McMurray, Peter Farrell and C. A. Sampson. They asked for a lot of land belonging to old government house property on which to erect an isolation hospital. The delegation

Colored Man Indicted for Serious Crime at the Court of King's Bench--Congratulatory Addresses to Chief Justice Landry

The June term of the Court of the King's Bench opened this morning. His Honor Chief Justice Landry, presiding.

At the opening of the court Mr. A. R. Slipp, K.C., M.P.P., rose to extend the congratulations of the members of the bar, to His Honor for his recovery from his late severe illness, and his appointment to the Chief Justiceship of the King's Bench division.

Chief Justice Landry replied in a few modest remarks in which he expressed his warm appreciation of the generous attitude of the bar and the public in general to himself.

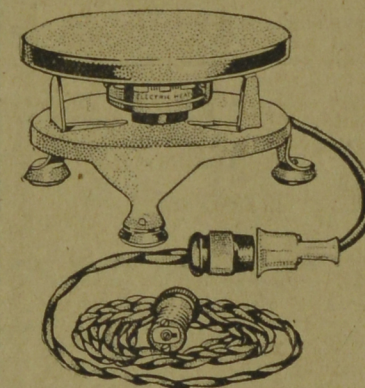

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NO MILITARY HONORS FOR NEW CARDINAL

Ottawa June 2:—The minister of militia and most of the headquarters staff being out of town, a statement was not obtainable today in regard to a report that the minister of militia has refused to allow a Quebec regiment to turn out at the reception to Cardinal Begin tomorrow.

It is stated, however, that the same situation arose once before and it was then demonstrated that princes of the church, or other ecclesiastical dignitaries, are not in list of those entitled to military honors or guards of honors. The king, royalty, governor-general or governors and certain high military officers are alone eligible to receive such honors.
