## LT. BERTRAM DENISON WAS KILLED IN ACTION

(Toronto Globe.)  
"Killed in action."  
The first of those brief but pregnant messages which in a few weeks must mean across the Atlantic bed to Canada reached Toronto yesterday, when Col. G. T. Denison received news of the death of his nephew, Lieut. Bertram Noel Denison of the Yorkshire Light Infantry in Belgium. No details are given, the official message from the War Office merely announcing the death and nothing more.

Lieut. Denison, who was thirty-four years old, and born in England, had spent a long time in Canada. He was the son of Admiral Denison and a nephew of Lieut. Col. George T. Denison, Lieut. Col. Clarence A. Denison, both of Toronto, and of Col. Septimus Denison of Montreal. Four years ago he married a daughter of Mr. Albert Nordheimer of 97 St. George street. The marriage took place at St. James' Cathedral and was marked by imposing military decoration. There is one child, Yvonne, and it is anticipated that Mrs. Denison and her little daughter will now return to Canada.

The late Lieut. Denison entered the Royal Navy when thirteen years old. While a midshipman he served throughout the South African war as aide-de-camp to the commander of the naval force. Later he left the navy and, after passing through Sandhurst, where he had a brilliant career, was attached to the Operations Branch of the War Office. He was a member of the Canadian force from 1906 to 1908, and subsequently received a commission in the Yorkshire Light Infantry.

Only six weeks ago he was in Toronto, visiting his relatives here.

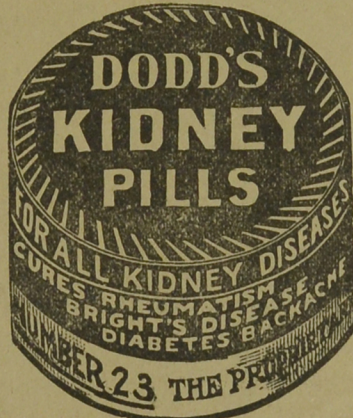
## OFFICERS ELECTED IN THE Y.P.S.C.E. OF BAPTIST CHURCH

## ENERGY IN COAL

Work Done by Men or Horses is Little in Comparison

Does any one realize the power of coal as a worker? A man was set to work to pump as hard as he could all day, and at the end of 10 hours it was found that he had done just as much work as a little less than two ounces of coal could do.

Taking all the energy put forth by a hard-working man during one whole year, the same amount of force would be furnished by 36 pounds of good coal, or say 40 pounds of average coal.

Of course, even in our best engines the greater part of the working energy of coal is wasted. But even if only one-tenth is turned to account, one and a half hundredweight of coal is equal to a man working for 300 days of the year.

A horse can do as much work as 10 men, but one and a quarter pounds of coal has as much force as a horse expends in one day. So that a ton of coal, if we could use all its force, would do as much work as six horses working for a whole year.

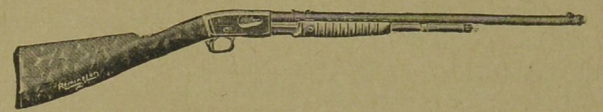
