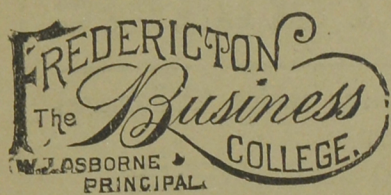

## Music Examinations 1915

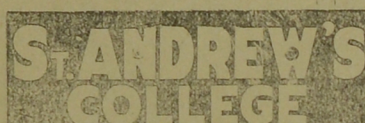
Opens to the Pupils of all Teachers of Music.

CANADIAN FLOUR  
IS AT LIVERPOOL

London, Sept. 3.—The first consignment of Canadian flour arrived by the Tunisian on Monday, and according to arrangements made by the local government board will be stored at various ports until required. In the opinion of the imperial government committee, which is acting in such matters, the best method of using the dominion's gift will be its distribution among civilians at a later date, when the inevitable distress of poverty is more apparent. At the present time the price of flour is little changed. It has been found impracticable to use the flour for the troops as such provision on a larger scale would cause discontent and possibly a charge of breach of agreement on the part of certain contractors. It is expected that some of the principal ports will follow the example of Liverpool by offering free storage and dockage and it is expected also that the railways will grant free transport.

Local committees will also be formed to deal with the distribution of the flour. In this connection the interesting suggestion was made by an official of the local government board to your correspondent, that bread from this flour should bear a distinctive mark or label conveying the information that it is part of Canada's generous gift. He said that his department would readily welcome any suggestions on this point. The board has received an offer by letter from a large firm of bakers in the East End of London, to bake a large batch of bread from the flour free but as the name of the firm had a very Teutonic sound the offer is not taken seriously.

With regard to the suggestion made through The Pall Mall Gazette, to aid the patriotic fund, by the sale of empty flour sacks, at five shillings each, the board has requested the paper to throw out feelers on the subject. It was pointed out that as the sacks would bear the distinctive mark of the Canadian government, this would be cut out as souvenirs.

Quebec's cheese, Nova Scotia's coal and British Columbia's apples, will also be dealt out by the local government board at convenient periods. The coal is not immediately needed, as the price has slightly declined. The oats from Alberta and Prince Edward Island will probably be distributed by the war office as forage for the troops.

## CHEAP FARES FOR LABOR DAY

Via the Intercolonial Railway cheap fares will prevail for Labor Day. Tickets will be issued at single fare for the round trip on Sept. 7th, good for return the day following. Special excursion fares on Sept. 5, 6, and 7. Good for return Sept. 9, 10, and 11.

## LOOKING AFTER YOUNG CHICKS

Plenty of Shade and Good Wholesome Food Give Best Results

Green food is absolutely essential during the growing period. It can be most economically supplied by growing it directly upon the range. When the chicks are crowded on small areas considerable expense must be incurred in supplying it from an outside source in the form of cabbage, grass clippings or sprouted grains, says Harry Lewis of New Jersey College of Agriculture, in Suburban Life. A range which can be kept seeded to a permanent sod is the best, but, where the birds are kept in such numbers as to destroy the grass, it will be found desirable to divide the area into two plots, and rotate them by alternating the areas and raising quick-growing, succulent crops, such as peas and oats, rape, buckwheat, millet, and, during the winter, as a catch or cover crop, rye, wheat, vetch and crimson clover, singly or in combination. The birds can then eat the succulence directly off the root, and the plowing and seeding purify the runs and utilize the manure to grow the crop. An abundance of shade is necessary for a normal, healthy development. Natural shade is the most desirable, where it cannot be secured, artificial shelters must be constructed. Muslin frames, set at an angle to prevent birds roosting on them, are efficient. A rough shelter of bushes or boughs, elevated from the ground about two feet, by laying on cratched sticks, will answer very well. The most desirable shade is that given by a growing plant. It is much cooler, due to the large amount of moisture given off. An ideal practice is to plant the range in fruit trees—peaches, plums or apples being desirable. When trees are not present, or while they are making a sufficient growth, it will be found profitable to plant such crops as corn, sunflowers and soja beans between the rows.

The summer colony or developing houses should provide three features—namely, fresh air, sufficient size, and must be easily moved, or portable. They should be portable to facilitate moving them from place to place during succeeding seasons as the range is changed, or, as is often the case it is desired to use them for small laying flocks during the winter. The design should provide an abundance of fresh air, without causing drafts to blow across the roosting-place at night. Crowded, stuffy sleeping quarters will weaken the vitality of a lot of youngsters quicker than any other one cause. If the house can be constructed to furnish considerable shade, that is another advantage. It is a mistake to build small, tucked-up colony houses, as for example 2x4 feet, which are often seen on small plants. Such houses are hard to ventilate properly, and the tendency is to crowd too many chicks into one flock with disastrous results. The desirable colony unit is about fifty chicks, the exact capacity depending upon floor space and method of ventilation.

## WON \$1000 FROM

BANK OF B. N. A.

Amherst News—One thousand dollars damages to M. B. Vail for an accident he suffered in St. John is among decisions deferred from the July sitting of the Supreme Court. Mr. Vail claimed ten thousand dollars from the Bank of British North America, claiming to be permanently injured. He was struck by a heavy window sash which fell from a temporary structure erected about the bank building while remodeling was in progress.

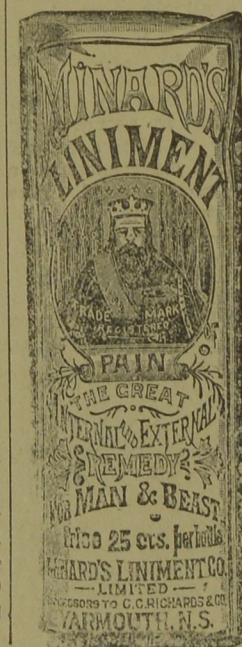
At the time Mr. Vail was with the Amherst curlers who were returning from a curling match in Boston. He sustained a severe shock, and was laid up some time.

Judge Drysdale in rendering verdict in favor of the plaintiff found there was neglect in the sash being loose but Mr. Vail was not entitled to more than a thousand dollars, because not permanently injured. The court held Mr. Vail's dejected eye, sight was more in the course of nature.

An imposing array of counsel were brought on to defend the action. There were lawyers from St. John and from Halifax. Of the latter there were J. A. Chisholm, K.C. for former mayor of Halifax, and Humphrey Mellish, K. C., one of the cleverest in Canada, the defender of Mrs. Tena Atkinson in the Sydney murder trial. Rogers, Milne and Purdy looked after Mr. Vail's interests.

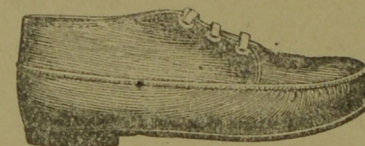
