NEW OFFICERS
TO BE APPOINTED
TO 71ST. REGIMENT

Vacancies Created by Officers Enlisting for War Service Will be Filled---Capt. Woodbridge may Become Adjutant

Owing to the fact that ten officers of the 71st Regt. have enlisted for overseas service with the first Canadian contingent, now in camp at Valcartier, Quebec, it is now necessary to appoint new men to fill the vacancies.

Major W. H. Gray will be the officer commanding and it is understood that Capt. Howard F. G. Woodbridge will succeed Capt. J. R. McPeake as adjutant of the regiment. Lieut. A. Sterling McFarlane will likely be promoted to the command of "D" Company and two new lieutenants will be appointed to take the places of Lieut. C. W. Clarke and Lieut. Frank Eason, who have gone to the front.

Lieut. Percy A. Gerow will likely take over the command of "A" Company and it will be necessary to have two new lieutenants attached to Capt. George Ryder's company. The list of officers is Capt. W. J. Osborne's and Capt. F. A. Good's companies remain intact while two new lieutenants will be appointed to fill the vacancies in "E" Company.

PROWIDENT PASTOR HERE.

STOLE MONEY
FROM BOARDING
HOUSE MISTRESS

St. John Man Arrested for Drunkenness Confesses to the Theft of \$26---Has Previously Borne a Good Character

When arraigned before Magistrate Limerick in the police court this morning, James O'Leary, of St. John, confessed to having stolen the sum of \$26, from his boarding mistress, a Mrs. Ross, who resides on Westmorland Street.

O'Leary came here some time ago and was employed as a stone cutter with John Moore & Sons. Of late he had taken to drinking quite heavily and he told the police this morning that he must have stolen the money while under the influence of liquor.

He is a man about forty-five years of age and feels his position quite keenly, owing to the fact that this is the first criminal offence he has ever committed.

At the afternoon session of the police court Magistrate Limerick sentenced O'Leary to one year's imprisonment in the county jail.

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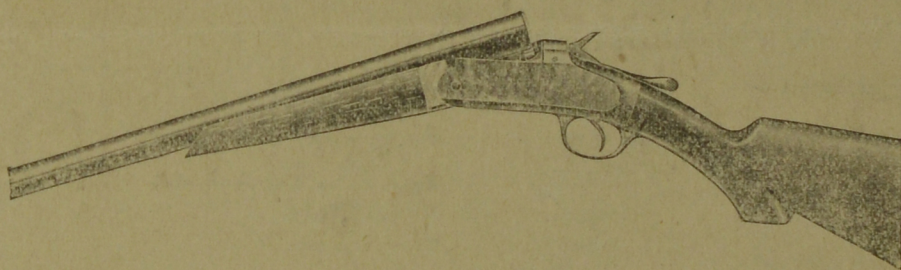
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
