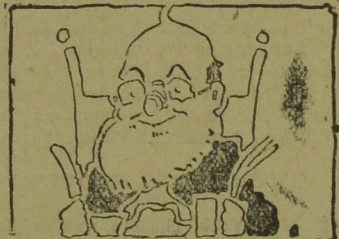

NEWS OF FREDERICTON TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

(From The Weekly Herald of Saturday, May 27, 1893.)

ALUMNI MEDAL—Miss Frances Everett, a York county girl, niece of Benj. Everett of Long's Hotel, is the winner of the Alumni Gold Medal given for Latin Essay at the U.N.B.

LECTURE AT KINGSCLEAR—Professor Robertson delivered a lecture at the MacKinley Hall at Kingsclear to the patrons of the Kingsclear Creamery Thursday night. It is understood that the creamery butter which the professor took to England with him last year to sell on behalf of the Kingsclear farmers, did not realize the expected price owing to a decline in the English market. On the other hand, the butter which the dominion government bought on speculation and resold in England realized handsome profits.

RUNAWAY—Considerable amusement was caused on York street on Thursday night by the running away of Percy Edgecombe's Shetland pony and cart, which dashed all the way out the street to the C.P.R. depot, resisting all attempts of capture, turning in the depot and coming back at a rattling pace to King street. No damage was done to cart or harness.

AN EXCURSION DELAYED—The Y.M.C.A. excursion from St. John to Fredericton on the 24th met with so many delays that it did not reach here until about seven p.m. It started from St. John in the Olivette but before they were very far from St. John it was discovered that the machinery would not work very satisfactorily. At John O. VanWart's landing a stop was made and the excursionists were transferred to the David Weston. She brought the party here and started to return at St. John at eleven p.m.

MUCH NEEDED REPAIRS—The old plank sidewalk on the lower side of York street between Brunswick and George streets, has been taken up and the ground levelled. The City Council will probably lay an asphalt walk from King street to George street this summer.

SET AT LIBERTY—On the Queen's Birthday Major Gen. Hebert telegraphed to all Royal Canadian Corps, including the company at Fredericton, and ordered remission of all unexpired military punishments. As a consequence, Privates McMurray and McElroy of the R.R.C.L., who were serving a term in the county jail, under sentence of a district court martial, were set at liberty Thursday afternoon.

IN BUSINESS FOR HIMSELF—Albert E. Massie, late of J. D. Fowler's jewelry establishment, has bought out the stock in trade and business of M. A. Kelly, boots and shoes. Mr. Kelly goes to Doaktown

to work in the establishment of Messrs. Swim.

THE VISITORS FROM WOODSTOCK—The steamer Florenceville brought about seventy-five excursionists from Woodstock to Fredericton on the 24th inst.

BUILDING AT MARYSVILLE—Alex. Gibson is arranging for the erection of twenty double brick houses at Marysville. The brick-yards are running at full blast and the town is alive with bustle and enterprise.

LOST HER SIGHT—Many friends of Miss Lottie Cliff of the York Street School, will learn with great regret that she has been totally deprived of her sight since going to Boston for treatment.

FISHING TRIP—N. W. Brown returned Thursday night from a fishing trip of three days on the headwaters of the Kennebecasis in company with Dr. Fleming and Inspector Smith of Petitcodiac. They had splendid sport, hooking about ten dozen large trout.

CUT OFF HIS TAIL—On the night of the 24th some parties unknown entered the barn at the rear of Lee's Opera House, where Blanche Dunphy's blind pony was stabled, and deliberately cut off the creature's tail. Such a barbarous act deserves the severest punishment.

LUMBER DRIVES—News from the lumber drives from all sections of the province is most encouraging. As yet no drives are reported hung up. Michael Welsh's drive of three and a half million on Burnt Hill Brook is out in the main Miramichi in corporation limits. Wm. Richards and Timothy Lynch are getting along well on the Southwest Miramichi. On the Keswick, Richardson's drive, including two years of nearly nine million, is safe and the same may be said of W. H. Lawrence's. R. A. Estey's drive of one and a half million on the Upper Tobique is in the main river Beveridge's drive of three million and Hale's drive of four million in the same waters are also safe. Piano Player

Great Strength Developed in Fingers of Famous Players

The amount of power expended on playing on a piano has recently been figured out in a way which, if altogether accurate, is at least interesting. Commenting on the statement that it already requires more force to sound a note gently on the instrument than it does to lift the lid of a kettle, it is easy to verify it if one takes a small handful of coins and piles them in a key of the piano.

When a sufficient quantity is piled on to make a note sound they may be weighed, and the figures will be found to be true. If the pianist is playing fortissimo, a much greater force is needed. At times the force of six pounds is thrown upon a single key to produce a solitary effect. With chords the force is generally spread over the various notes sounded simultaneously, though a greater output of force is undoubtedly expended. This is what gives pianists the wonderful strength in their fingers that is often commented on.

A story used to be told of Paderewski that he could crack a pane of French plate-glass, half an inch thick, merely by placing one hand upon it as if upon a piano keyboard and striking it sharply with his middle finger.

Chopin's last piece in C minor has a passage which takes two minutes and five seconds to play. The total pressure brought to bear on his fingers is estimated, is equal to three full tons. The average "tonnage" of an hour's playing of Chopin's music varies from twelve to eighty-four tons. Wagner has not yet been calculated upon these lines.

Feeding Brood Mares

An interesting experiment carried out by G. L. Carlson in connection with the feeding of brood mares seems to show that oats are better than corn for breeding mares; that oats and bran are better than oats alone, that hay without grain is better than with grain, and that natural conditions on grass beat everything. The following table gives the results:

THE CIGARETTE CURE

Solution of Nitrate of Silver Kills the Craving For Tobacco

Thousands of boys have been cured of the cigarette habit by having a little nitrate of silver rubbed upon their tonsils. It has been discovered that a solution of one-half of one per cent. of this drug has the strange quality of abating the appetite for tobacco. Usually a fortnight's treatment will effect a cure. For the first week the mouth is rinsed out after each meal; in the second week one application a day is sufficient. As nitrate of silver is poison, care must be taken to avoid swallowing any of it, although the risk from such a weak solution is not very great. A doctor who has had considerable experience says that if a small piece of gentian is chewed when there is a strong desire for a smoke the craving will be abated.

To Clean a Coat Collar

A tablespoonful of powdered ammonia in half a teacupful of water is a safe cleaning mixture. Dip into it a piece of cloth and rub the soiled coat collar until it is clean. Alcohol or benzine will do the work, but should be applied out of doors, away from fire or lights, to prevent accident.
