PANIC AMONG THE PASSENGERS

Stories of the frightful panic which broke out in the darkness as the ship listed and her lights went out; of the futile efforts of the crew to lower the boats, which was made impossible by the strong list of the ship and desperate struggle which occurred in the water after the ship gave the last plunge, are told by the survivors, all of whom were witness es of the disaster which will go down n history as the most appalling in the history of navigation in the St. Lawrence River.

Special praise was given by the passengers to the heroic work of Dr. J. F. Grant of Victoria, B.C., who was ship:s surgeon on the Empress. It is estimated that by his coolness and his authority over the survivors he managed to save a large number who were taken out of the water but who would have perished had they not received prompt medical atten-

There was also repeated mention made of the open-hearted hospitality of the French-Canadian people of Rimouski, who deprived themselkes of the comforts of their homes in order that they might give every

help to the shipwrecked passengers.

Much appreciation was also expressed for the way in which the Intercolonial Ranway Company sent down a special relief train this morning, and on instructions from Mr. Cutelius, general in mager, did even thing that could be done to give relief to the sufferers.

SHIP'S SURGEON.

Among those who rushed to the rescue of the survivors at Rimouski at River du Loup.

"I was in my cabin and heard nothing until the boat listed so badly that I tumbled out of my berth was no power.
