DETAILS OF DISASTER

(Continued From Page 1.)

PANIC AMONG THE PASSENGERS

Stories of the frightful panic which
broke out in the darkness as the
ship listed and her lights went out;
of the futile efforts of the crew to
lower the boats, which was made
impossible by the strong list of the
ship and desperate struggle which
occurred in the water after the ship
gave the last plunge, are told by the
survivors, all of whom were witness-
es of the disaster which will go down
in history as the most appalling in
the history of navigation in the St.
Lawrence River.

Special praise was given by the
passengers to the heroic work of Dr.
J. F. Grant of Victoria, B.C., who
was ship's surgeon on the Empress.
It is estimated that by his coolness
and his authority over the survivors
he managed to save a large number
who were taken out of the water but
who would have perished had they
not received prompt medical atten-
tion.

There was also repeated mention
made of the open-hearted hospitality
of the French-Canadian people of
Rimouski, who deprived themselves
of the comforts of their homes in
order that they might give every
help to the shipwrecked passengers.

Much appreciation was also expres-
sed for the way in which the Inter-
colonial Railway Company sent down
a special relief train this morning,
and on instructions from Mr. Guter-
lius, general manager, did every-
thing that could be done to give
relief to the sufferers.

GRAPHIC STORY OF SHIP'S SURGEON.

Among those who rushed to the
rescue of the survivors at Rimouski
was J. H. Brassard, chief dispatcher
at River du Loup.

A graphic description of the scene
on the Empress after the collision
was given to the Quebec Chronicle
by Dr. J. F. Grant, the surgeon on
the Empress, who described the aw-
ful scene as follows:

"I was in my cabin and heard
nothing until the boat listed so bad-
ly that I tumbled out of my berth
and rolled under it. I concluded
that something had gone wrong and
tried to turn on the light but there
was no power. I tried to find the
door-bolt but the list was so strong
that it took me considerable time
to open the door. When I reached
the alleyway it was so steep, due to
the fact that the ship was canted,
that my efforts to climb up were
rendered impossible by the carpet. I
then scrambled up and stuck my head
through a porthole, but I was un-
able to get my shoulders through.
At that time the ship was lying al-
most flat in the water on her star-
board side and a passenger who was
standing on the plates in the side of
the ship finally managed to pull me
through the porthole. About one
hundred passengers were standing on
the side of the ship at the time and
a moment after I had joined them,
the ship took another list and plun-
ged to the bottom.

"I next found myself in the water
and swam towards the lights of the
steamer Storstad and when nearly
exhausted from the struggle and the
exposure, I was picked up by a life-
boat which went on to the scene of
the disaster and was loaded with
survivors who were pulled out of the
water and taken on board the Stor-
stad. Then we were heated and
wrapped in blankets and I was pro-
vided with the clothes which I now
wear and which enabled me to do
what I could to help the survivors,
some of whom were in such an ex-
hausted condition that they died."

MAY BE SAVED

A. R. Slipp, M. P. P. who is at
Quebec wired R. B. Hanson his law-
partner this morning to the effect
that he had spoken with Mr. Geo.
Ham of the C.P.R. and by him had
been told that there was a possibi-
lity that David Johnston who resid-
ed in Kingsclear was among those
saved also that Mrs. W. Leonard
Palmer who had been in Fredericton
in company with her husband was
also among those rescued.

Friends of both will hope that
the possibility becomes a fact. There
seems to be no hope however that
Mr. Palmer was saved.

SALVATIONISTS DROWNED

A large party of officials of the
Salvation Army were aboard the ill-
fated vessel and of one hundred and
sixty-five only twenty have been
saved according to recent reports.
Many of those who were lost, were
natives of this province and a num-
ber have been stationed in Frederic-
ton or conducted services here.

NEW TIMETABLE FOR C. P. R. IN FORCE SUNDAY

Double Service Restored on Gibson
Branch--Some Changes on
Fredericton Branch

The new time-table of the C.P.R.
goes into effect tomorrow, May 31.
The most prominent feature is the
restoration of two daily trains on
the Gibson Branch. On that division
there will be no change of time. De-
partures from Fredericton for Wood-
stock will be as follows:—No. 191,
6.50 a.m. and No. 193, 2.45 a.m. Ar-
rivals will be:—No. 192, 11.35 a.m.
and No. 94, 8.00 p.m.

Some changes are made on the
Fredericton Branch. Departures are
as follows:—No. 106 for St. John,
Boston, etc., 5.10 a.m.; No. 108 for
St. John and points east, 8.20 a.m.
instead of 8.40 as at present; No.
110 for Montreal, Boston and points
west, 4.50 p.m.; No. 112 for St. John
and points east, 8.00 p.m. Arrivals
are as follows:—No. 107 from St. John
and points east, 8.10 a.m. instead of
8.20 a.m.; No. 109 from Boston,
Montreal and points west 10.20 a.m.
instead of 10.35 a.m. as at present;
No. 105 from St. John and points
east 6.50 p.m.; No. 111 from Boston
9.50 p.m.

Eastern Standard time is given in
each case and is one hour earlier
than Atlantic Standard time in gen-
eral use in New Brunswick. No
changes on the Fredericton-Norton
Division are to be made.

WENT TO NORMAL SCHOOL

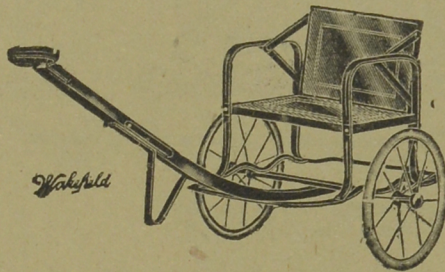
Capt. Everett DeBow who was one
of the Salvationists lost on the
Empress is a native of Forest Glen
Westmorland County, a place near
Petitcodiac. He was a student of the
Provincial Normal School here about
six years ago and at that time be-
came connected with the Salvation
Army. He was a soldier in the local
S. A. corps for a year after which
he entered the field. His advance-
ment in the Salvation Army was rap-
id and at the time of his death
was secretary to Commissioner Cup-
ping. The latter intended to sail
for England today, but on account
of the disaster his departure is
postponed indefinitely.

Commissioner Rees, with his wife,
one son and two daughters was
drowned. He was here about two
years ago. Col. Maidment his secre-
tary who was lost with his wife on
the Empress was also here at that
time.

The loss of the officers is a serious
one which has left the Salvation
Army in mourning throughout Can-
ada.
