NOTED SCIENTISTS MEET IN WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C., Dec. 27—Philo-
logists from nearly all the leading in-
stitutions of learning in the United
States as well as from some of the
Canadian and European universities,
met in this city today to delve into

languages and to gain knowledge
through the exchange of hypothesis
on the many debatable questions of
antiquity. The scientists are members
of the American Philological Associ-
ation and of the Archaeological Insti-
tution of America, which began their
annual meeting today in the new
building of the National Museum.
The annual meeting of the So-
ciety of Biblical Literature is
being held in conjunction with the
other scientific bodies. One of the
leading features of the gathering will
be a reception for the visitors at the
home of Ambassador Bryce, who is
himself an ardent student of archae-
ology.

RALPH ROSE RETIRES FROM ATHLETIC WORLD

San Francisco, December 27—Ralph
Rose, the giant shot-putter, and one
of the world's most famous athletes
has announced his retirement.
Ralph's increasing weight and busi-
ness causes him to quit. Rose has
been a member of the Olympic teams.

In 1908, at London, he captured the
shot-put easily. In the games at Stock-
holm last summer he also made a
good showing. Rose is the holder of
number of world's records. He is 6
feet 5 inches tall, and weighs at pre-
sent around 300 pounds. Four years
ago he tipped the beam at 240.

RED SOX SIGN PITCHER MARTINA

Joseph Martina, a pitcher, whose
release was purchased from the Beau-
mont Club of the Texas League last
Fall by the Boston American League
Club has signed a contract with the
Red Sox for next season, and the
same was received at the club's Bos-
ton office.

Martina lives in New Orleans. He
is 23 years old, stands 5 feet 4 inches,
and weighs 178 pounds. He throws
and bats right handed. He was
recommended by the Red Sox scout,
Patsy Donovan.

HIGHLANDERS GET GREENE

New York, Dec. 28—The New York
American League Baseball Club an-
nounced today that it had recalled
full title to Patrick Greene, the big
pitcher of the Holyoke Club of the
Connecticut League. Greene, who is
only 18 years old, but weighs 202
pounds, and is 6 feet, 2 inches tall,
will be "kept on the payroll until
Frank Chance has seen him in action"
the club's announcement says. He
began to play semi-professional ball
in 1911 near his home at Huntington,
Mass.

cepting bribes in connection with
bills pending before the last legisla-
ture.

drews previous to his election to the
senate had served two terms as pro-
secutor of Lawrence county. An-
drews is a Republican and Huffman
a Democrat.

Chicago, Dec. 29—Waivers have
been asked on Mike Donlin, the vet-
eran outfielder, by the Pittsburgh
Club. As yet no club has refused to
waive on him and it appears that he
is due to return to the minors.

Donlin did well at the bat for
Pittsburg last year until he broke a
toe and was forced to sit out most
of the remainder of the season on the
bench. Nor was his fielding as fast
before his injury as in former years.

Rumors have been current during
the winter that Donlin might become
a manager next year and if he lands
such a position he may not return
to the smaller leagues as a player.
