I heat and light my hotel with it and can hear witness to its efficiency. I keep three furnaces going and heat by means of seventy-five radiators. There is no coal to handle and no ashes or clinkers to haul away; and the results are highly satisfactory. I have four 400, candle power lights in the office and dining room, which not only give a rich, mellow light but the cost by meter test does not exceed one half cent per light per hour.
