MUNICIPAL COUNCILLORS FINISH THEIR BUSINESS

**McAdam Wants the Fees From Its Police
Court--Janitor of Court House Has His
Salary Increased--Jailor Timmons must
Wait--Presentation to Warden Hunter**

The Municipal Council ended its
semi-annual session Thursday after-
noon. A very pleasing feature of the
final session was the presentation to
Warden Hunter on the part of the
councillors of an address and a
handsome travelling bag. There was
little business transacted at the
final session.

When the Municipal Council resumed
Thursday afternoon Coun. Pond
moved a resolution that all docu-
ments of value being transferred to
and from the office of the secretary-
treasurer by mail be registered and
also that the resolution become a
bylaw. Carried.

PROTEST FROM MCADAM.

Coun. Lawson drew attention to
the fact that the Parish of McAdam
maintained its police magistrate and
its policeman. He thought the parish
was entitled to the fines imposed
by its police court.

In reply to Coun. Essensa, Coun.
Lawson said McAdam was willing to
pay all cost of the enforcement of
the Canada Temperance Act.

DELINQUENT LISTS.

Coun. Pond, discussing the collec-
tion of taxes which were in arrears,
stated that no delinquent list had
been furnished his district of the
Parish of Stanley. He had been in-
formed that the list was withheld
because the former collector had over-
paid his account.

Secretary-Treasurer Bliss made an
explanation of the matter stating
that the former collector had not
submitted correct accounts. He would
prefer, however, that the matter be
thrashed out in his office rather than
in council.

Coun. Pond made some more re-
marks along the same line that he
had followed before.

Warden Hunter said the discussion
was out of order.

Coun. Sterling asked the permis-
sion of the chair to make a state-
ment. He thought there was a mis-
understanding. The office of secre-
tary-treasurer intended no discour-
tesy to the Parish of Stanley or any
of its representatives. What Coun.
Pond wanted was the striking off of
delinquent lists of many years past
which were not in existence and were
occupying unnecessary space in the
annual report.

On the motion of Coun. Pond, the
secretary-treasurer was instructed to
search for delinquent lists of past
years and forward them to the col-
lectors.

SALARY INCREASE.

For a special committee on salar-
ies Coun. Walker reported to the
effect that the salary of Thomas
Davidson, the janitor of the County
Court House, be increased \$100 and
also that the gaoler's salary be in-
creased.

The report was considered section
by section. The increase to the jan-
itor of the County Court House was
voted, making his salary \$500 per
year.

Coun. Everett moved that the sal-
ary of the gaoler be increased \$100
per year to begin in January.

Coun. Pond in amendment, moved
that consideration of the matter be
deferred till January next.

The amendment was carried.
The usual remuneration to chap-
lain, press representatives and con-
stabularies was voted on the motion of
Coun. Walker.

PRESENTATION TO WARDEN.

Just before the close of the ses-
sion Coun. Pickard read the follow-
ing address to Warden Hunter:
Samuel B. Hunter, Esq.,
Warden of York:

Dear Sir:—We, the county coun-
cillors of the Municipality of York, de-
sire to express our hearty apprecia-
tion of the uniform, able, courteous
and considerate manner in which you
have discharged the duties pertaining
to the office of warden. Your years
of experience as a member of the
council, your ability and your natu-
ral disposition, have enabled you to
preside over the deliberations of
the council in a manner that has been
entirely satisfactory to the members
of this board.

We ask you, sir, to accept this
small token of our appreciation of
your many good qualities and as a
slight expression of our warm per-
sonal feeling toward you.

Accompanying the address was a
handsome travelling bag.

Warden Hunter then replied to the
address, expressing hearty feelings of
good will toward his colleagues and
thanking them for the gift.

After the reading of the minutes,
the council adjourned.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

The Municipal Council resumed
business at ten-thirty Thursday
morning.

On the motion of Coun. Brewer the
committee of the readjustment of the
cost of administration of justice be-
tween the City of Fredericton and
County of York was continued in
office with instructions to report at
the January session.

On the motion of Coun. Grant the
vote of thanks was tendered the same
committee.

Coun. Neill presented a bill for in-
terment of the remains of a Russian
killed on the Fredericton & Grand
Lake Railway in the Parish of St.
Mary's and stated that it was cus-
tomary when no domicile could be
proven for the county as a whole
to pay the cost of burial, which in
this case was \$39.50.

On motion it was decided that the
county should pay the bill.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS REPORT.

Coun. Harry Smith presented the
report of the committee on public
accounts to the effect that the ac-
counts for the past six months had
been found correct and passed with
the exception of two. An item of
\$10 ordered by Hon. P. A. Landry to
be paid to C. D. Richards for de-
fending a man named Holmes had
been held up. In the account of J.
W. Smith, chairman of the Board of
Health, a deduction of \$2.50 had
been made for an overcharge of that
amount for attending the July ses-
sion. The report was adopted. The
item for Mr. Richards was withheld
on the advice of the secretary-tre-
asurer, who claimed a public defender
must act without recompense.

QUESTION OF SNARES.

Coun. Thompson asked what pow-
ers the council had in the matter of
snares being set upon private prop-
erty to the danger of cattle and
other stock.

Warden Hunter said the case had
arisen in the Parish of Manners-Sut-
ton, a farmer having complained to
the councillors that his cattle had
been caught in snares.

SCOTT ACT REPORT.

Secretary-Treasurer Bliss advised
Coun. Thompson consult the Crown
Land Department on the matter.

Coun. Morrison presented the re-
port of the Scott Act Committee.
Your Canada Temperance Act Com-
mittee beg leave to report as fol-
lows:

That on the 9th of January, 1914,
there was to the credit of the
Scott Act Fund, \$566.79.
Fines collected by inspector, \$250.
Received from Luke Lawson in
fines, \$100.
Total, \$906.69.

Fines amounting to \$200 have been
paid to the secretary-treasurer by
the Scott Act inspector, which has
been placed to the credit of the Scott
Act Fund.

Out of the above amount the in-
spector has held \$50 for expenses,
which are as follows:

William Duncan, raiding "Farm,"
\$2.
Allen Bros., team, raiding "Farm"
\$3.

Balance due inspector, \$45.50.
Total, \$50.50.
Balance in inspector's hands, \$9 cts
Inspector's salary for six months,
\$249.96.
Balance on hand, July 8, 1914,
\$616.13.

The report was adopted.

DELEGATES TO UNION.

On Coun. Grant's motion the coun-
cil proceeded to the election of dele-
gates to the Union of New Brunswick
Municipalities.

On the motion of Coun. Robert
Graham it was decided that three
delegates instead of five be sent.

The delegates selected were Coun.
Harry Smith, Coun. Grant and
Coun. Walker.

Coun. Grant claimed that he had
understood that the secretary-tre-
asurer was to be a delegate exclusive
of the three delegates elected. Other
councillors expressed the same opin-
ion and stated also that the warden
should be one.
