An Invisible Clock

A public clock which can be heard but not seen is one of London's curious possessions. It is in the tower of St. Mary Abbott's Church, Kensington, and is the only public clock in the immediate neighborhood. It chimes the quarters and the hours, but commits itself no further. It has no dial, no hands, no outward and visible sign of any kind to show that it is a clock. This eccentricity, it is explained, is the result of two causes, one aesthetic, the other financial. When the tower was built in 1879 a clock was suggested as an afterthought, but the architect protested that it would mean the addition of 15 feet to the tower, and the ruin of its cherished proportions. A second point was that the church, having but slender funds, could not afford a clock with a dial. A compromise was arrived at by installing the works of a chiming clock in the belfry, without dial or hands.

Heated Steering Wheels

Electrically-heated steering wheels are one of the latest devices in automobiles, and a novel improvement on these is a glove that becomes heated on contact with the wheel. Wheel without glove or glove without wheel is cold. A pair of gauntlets encase a pair of soft inner gloves, in the fabric of which a very tough and flexible wire circuit is interwoven in such a way as entirely to cover the back of the hand and all the fingers. Upon the steering wheel are two thin plates on the upper and lower sides which are supplied with current by a wire from the battery passing up the steering column. The gloved hand in contact with these plates completes the circuit and the current heats.

In the field the Imps had a bad day and their errors contributed to the general result.

George Walker worked in the box for the Morns for two innings and was replaced by Don Campbell the latest addition to the pitching staff. Walker did good work against the Imps but Campbell had them eating out of his hand. He struck out eight of fifteen batters who faced him and allowed only two hits and no runs.

The defeat of the Imperials makes the league race more interesting as the Federals and September Morns are tied at the bottom of the league and the Imps are within easy distance of the Pets who are in second position. The Imps are now expected to take a brace. The Morns are also expected to go some, as the team now looks at its best.
