Paris, Dec. 1---The French troops have occupied all of the Vosges according to a telegram from Montceliard. The Message announces that the Germans have evacuated the three villages of Seppois, Moos and Bistle, abandoning a large quantity of ammunition and other war materials.

ANOTHER CALL FOR MEN

Copenhagen, Dec 1--- A German visitor states that all men up to the age of fifty years who have had military training have been called to arms by the German Emperor. He also declared that it was exceedingly probable that the so called untrained lanstrum which includes men rejected as unfit for military service, but possessing considerable physical strength would be called out.

THE FIGHTING AT POLAND

Amsterdam, Dec. I---An official statement given clares that despite the reports of an immense Russian victory in Poland given out in Petrograd the fighting still continues around Lodz without decisive result for either side. Since crossing the Polish frontier, the statement says, the Germans have captured 70,000 Russians 150 cannon, 200 machine guns and much ammunition and supplies.
