The senator was unable to tell how the system originated but he was inclined to think that the Roman magnates of old, who, when travelling, pennies to the people, may have been responsible for it,

"I venture to say," declared the senator, "that ninety per cent. of the people of Canada are opposed to this petty graft. Any one travelling who does not meet the demands of these highwaymen, who hold them up, is subjected to the very unpleasant consequences and would rather pay than be subjected to the sneers of those who look for tips. 


