BASEBALL CAUSED STRIKE IN OLDTOWN BOX FACTORY

Crew Quit Work Because They Could Not Have Saturday Afternoon off
---Wanted to Play Ball

Oldtown, Me., May 11—Something of a "baseball strike" is on at the box mills of the Jordan Lumber Company, where thirty-five employees mostly young men and boys, have quit work because the company would not grant Saturday afternoon off so that they could play baseball or see games.

The men presented a petition to the management to the effect that they would be willing to work overtime five days in the week to make up the Saturday afternoon. The management refused the petition on the ground that the change of schedule had been tried in times past and did not work well. The men then quit work and most of them have been paid off and discharged. They are unorganized and unskilled employees, receiving from \$1.50 to \$1.75 a day.

The strike does not affect the operation of the mills to any great extent. Another concern in the same business has granted the Saturday afternoon off request of its employees.

GRAND OPENING PLANNED FOR CELESTIAL CITY LEAGUE

Parade of the Four Clubs Headed by Band Planned for May 25th---Two Players Signed With Two Teams Suspended Indefinitely by League

A grand opening of the Celestial City Baseball League is planned for the afternoon of May 25th with a parade in uniform of the four clubs comprising the league and a band to lead the procession to the U.N.B. athletic field. This was discussed at a meeting of the league executive head last night.

The league meeting also dealt with the matter of players being signed with more than one team. Two such cases came before it and it was decided to suspend the two players from playing with any team until further notice. The players are Burgoyne, who was claimed by both the Federals and September Morns, and Wilson who has signed with the Imperials and the Federals. Another player, Garvie was signed with two clubs but obtained his release by both.

A committee was also appointed last night to secure umpires. It is probable that two officials will be engaged.

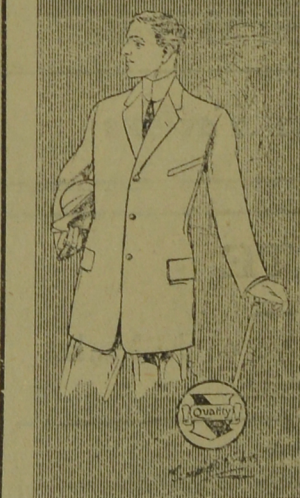
"One day, however, his luck changed and he began to make money. The time soon arrived when he was able to write a check for one hundred dollars and present it to his wife as a gift."
