## MT. ALLISON MARITIME INTERCOLLEGIATE CHAMPIONS

Score at Oxford, N. S., Was 6 to 2 Saturday Night  
Mount A Having Little Trouble Beating Dalhousie  
---Game Fast and Rough

Sackville, March 15—In a fiercely fought game played on neutral ice at Oxford, N.S., on Saturday evening Mount Allison University hockey team won the intercollegiate championship of the Maritime Provinces by defeating Dalhousie by a score of six to two. Star hockey was put up by both teams and the game was fast and clean throughout. A special train from Sackville and another from Halifax brought hundreds of supporters for both teams.

Soon after the opening of the first period the ice became very soft slowing up the Dalhousie forward line and breaking their combination. Captain Weldon Fraser of Dalhousie came to the front with a rank-length rush scoring the first goal. Prove of Mount Allison tied the score a few minutes before the whistle sounded.

In the second period Mount Allison put it all over their opponents, Godfrey being the shining star of the occasion, scoring three goals in fast time, giving Mount Allison a substantial lead. Weldon Fisher was handed a two minute rest for tripping and shortly afterward Leslie, Dalhousie's cover point was injured

causing a delay of several minutes. Leslie had one of his shoulders dislocated early in the season and was forced to retire several times during the game.

Early in third period Godfrey was given a two minute rest. Prove of Sackville scored after a clever run, followed by Brundage who netted Mt. Allison's sixth goal from a mix-up in front of Dalhousie's goal. William Fraser of Dalhousie scored the second goal for his team shortly before the close of the play.

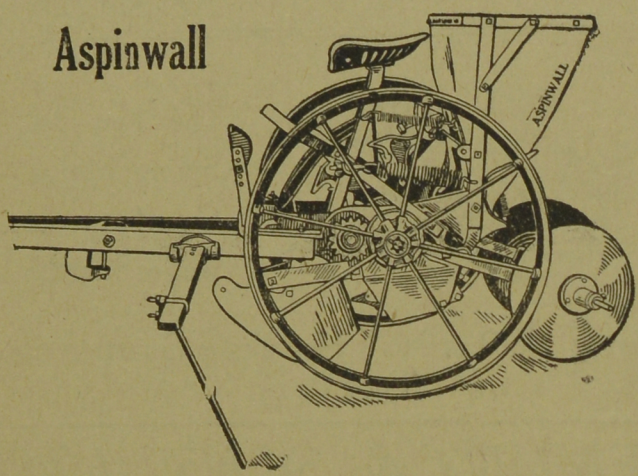
## ED. LAMY, SKATER BREAKS INTO BASEBALL

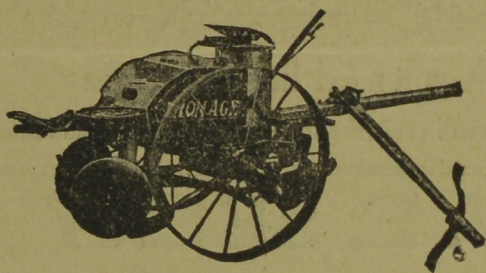
