SPECIAL MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Slipp & Hanson Counsel for Mayor In Matter of Recount---Adjournment of Special Meeting Over Twent-four Hours Illegal

His Worship Mayor Mitchell this morning retained Slipp & Hanson of this city, as counsel in connection with the application of ex-Ald. W. E. Farrell for a recount of ballots in connection with the mayoralty. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., M.P.P., had been suggested as counsel but he has left for Ottawa, to be absent a week. The City Council will meet Wednesday night in special session to consider the business which was to be before it last week when the sudden illness of City Clerk McCreedy brought the meeting to an abrupt close. The last meeting was adjourned until tomorrow night but it has been found that by the city bylaws a special meeting cannot be adjourned more than twenty-four hours so there was really no adjournment of the last meeting. Notice has been given for another special meeting to be held Wednesday.

SCHOOL ROOM FUMIGATED.

A case of scarlet fever among the pupils of Miss Boyd's department at the Charlotte Street School has caused the department to be closed today for the purpose of fumigation. The Board of Health fumigated the room and the department will reopen tomorrow. There was some excitement among the pupils of other departments of the school on account of the fumigation. Secretary Sampson of the School Board, states that there is no cause for apprehension as all reasonable precautions have been taken.

J. D. McKay Resigns Office of Fisheries Overseer for York

Has Acted For About Ten Years---Thos A. Niles Expected to Succeed Him---Several Others After the Job

J. D. McKay, city auditor, who has held the office of fisheries overseer for York county for some years past, has tendered his resignation to Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries. The resignation is to go into effect April 1. Mr. McKay has not yet heard from Ottawa concerning the acceptance of the resignation. Mr. McKay was appointed by the late Liberal government in 1906 and has performed his duties with satisfaction to the public since that time. Thomas A. Niles of this city, is understood to have the inside track for appointment as Mr. McKay's successor. There are a number of other aspirants, however, who will make determined efforts to land the job. Prior to the last Dominion general election, Joseph Hawkins of Douglas, was promised the appointment should the Conservatives be returned to power. He appears to be sidetracked at present.

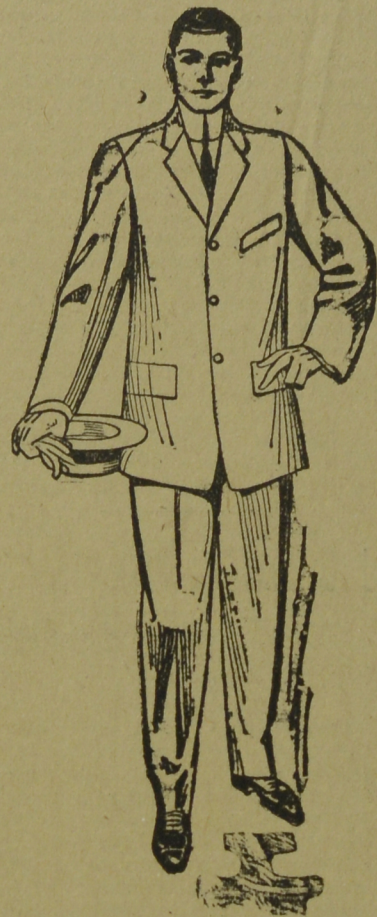

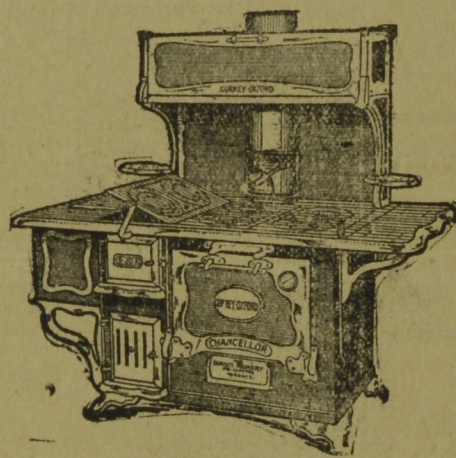
