crown of laurels and gold medal for
this kind of talk belongs to the post-
master general," Mr. Lemieux de-
clared, amid more uproar. Liberals
were shouting "Resign!" at Mr.
Rainville, and Conservatives "Take it
back!" to Mr. Lemieux.

Mr. Crothers rose and led the shout-
ing.

"If I take it back I shall have to
tear up Le Nationaliste, his gospel
and yours," cried Mr. Lemieux, when
Mr. Pelletier shouted again to the
deputy speaker to make him "take it
back."

"Take it back," screamed Mr. Pel-
letier.

STICKS TO HIS GUNS

"No, no," responded Mr. Lemieux,
shaking his head. "It is too true."

Mr. Pelletier rose and protested.

"The member for Rouville has got
to be courteous and civil to mem-
bers of this house. He said the
member for Chambly-Vercheres had
said that Canada owed nothing to
England. The member denies it and
he has got to take it back."

"I said that he made statements
worse than that," reiterated Mr.
Lemieux.

"The member for Chambly-Vercher-
es denies it," put in Deputy Speaker
Blondin.

"I say he said worse than that,"
persisted Mr. Lemieux, while the
house was in an uproar of conra-
dictory shouts of "Resign!" and
"Take it back!"

"The country will learn what kind
of proceedings we have here," shout-
ed Mr. Pelletier over the din.

"Take it back!" shrieked the Con-
servatives in the pandemonium.

"He won't take it back, and
there's no good trying to make
him," shouted Mr. Pelletier, while
the Liberals cheered Mr. Lemieux.

"Why should he?" cried Medrie
Martin. "It's true. I heard say it
myself. Let him carry out his pro-
mise and resign."

For several minutes the deputy
speaker pleaded for order, and at
last as it was restored Mr. Pelle-
tier precipitated another uproar by
calling in question Mr. Guthrie's
stand on reciprocity.

The member for South Wellington
rose instantly. "I did say during
last session that in my opinion re-
ciprocity was dead," said Mr. Gut-
rie, "but no one misunderstood my
position. I favored reciprocity then.
I think it is right now. I never
changed my opinion. When I spoke
I meant that it was not then the
immediate issue before the people. I
am for it now as much as ever
was."

There were now Liberal demands on
Mr. Pelletier to "take it back."

The postmaster General stated he
would accept the word of the mem-
ber for South Wellington, and order
was finally restored.

AMENDMENT DEFEATED

The house divided at midnight on
Sir Wilfrid Laurier's amendment, de-
claring that ministers had connived
at improper practices in MacDonald
and Richelieu. The amendment was
defeated, the vote being 119 to 71,
an adverse majority of 48.

Mr. Mondou then moved his amend-
ment declaring that there should be
no naval appropriation until the peo-
ple had been appealed to.

The Mondou amendment was de-
feated by a majority of 179, only
four members voted for it. These
were Messrs. Achin, Mondou, Lam-
arche and Barrett, Nationalists.

The Conservatives and Liberals,
who were led by Sir Wilfrid Lau-
rier, voted solidly against the mo-
tion.

The house adjourned at 1 o'clock.
The naval announcement will be
made Thursday.
