SMOOTH CROOK OF MANY ALIASES CAPTURED AT LAST

(Sussex Record)

With a string of aliases long enough to supply a dozen of his type, and wanted by the police in a score of Canadian and United States cities, one of the smoothest crooks who ever flim-flammed an unsuspecting public has run the length of his tether and now repases behind the bars in Kingston Penitentiary beginning a three-years sentence under one single charge, though if all reports are true he would need a long lifetime to satisfy justice were he convicted of all the charges against him. He lived at Halifax a couple of years ago and in fact married a Halifax girl, hoodwinking her as he has hoodwinked his many victims in his remarkable career of flim-flaming.

A. W. Smith, alias Charles W. Brae alias Arthur W. Braconsdale, alias Arthur W. Brownsey, alias A. W. Shields, alias Beggs, alias Boggs, alias scores of other titles and the self-recognized son of an English man and a grandson of one of the heads of Scotland Yard, were a few of the many colors that this smooth individual sailed under.

So far as can be learned his name is A. W. Smith, and he first became known to the Halifax police about a year ago when he pulled a couple of jobs in Truro and got away with them.

He is described as a man about thirty years of age, 5 feet, 9 inches in height, weighs 147 pounds, of medium build, fresh complexion, light brown hair, small brown moustache, of good address, gentlemanly in appearance and well spoken, stated at the time this description was given that he was a shoe traveller.

The above description was given by Chief of Police Ross of Ottawa the city in which "Smith" was finally arrested and received his sentence. Chief Ross knew him as "Braconsdale" and it was under this name that he was convicted.

As before stated about one year ago Chief Rudland, of Halifax got his first inkling of "Mr. Smith". He had before that solicited insurance in Halifax, in Amherst and New Glasgow, the information said. He also it is stated sold goods for a Halifax piano and organ company, under the alias of A. W. Shields. He passed bogus checks in Fredericton and in Sussex (N.B.) under the names of Boggs and Beggs, and secured advances on bogus checks. The man disappeared before the true value of the checks became known and all trace of him was lost at Amherst.

Here are some of his doings across the United States line. The Worcester chief of police writes that in the early spring of this year a Boston young man, Ross E. Conn by name, became acquainted with "Braconsdale" in Halifax. They later formed partnership and sold goods for the Norman Cordage Company, Boston.

He then stated that he was a son of Sir Hugh Braconsdale and was a lineal descendant of one of the heads of that great detective department of Scotland Yard. He informed Conn at the time that he expected remittances from relatives in England which remittance never came. Later the two dissolved partnership and then "our hero" got in his fine work in that vicinity, passing bogus checks in Boston and Brockton.

Now this man of many aliases and on almost unbelievable record of flim-flaming and getting away with it has shot his bolt. He was convicted in Ottawa some few days ago on the charge of theft while all these charges of a more serious nature have to wait. Those who will recall this man during his sojourn in Halifax will doubtless be more or less surprised to find that they numbered among their acquaintances as smooth a crook as ever forged a bank check. Boggs used bogus checks in this city at the store of F. B. Edgecombe and Oak Hall.

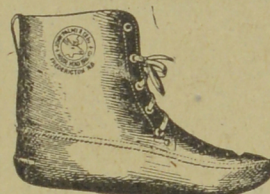
