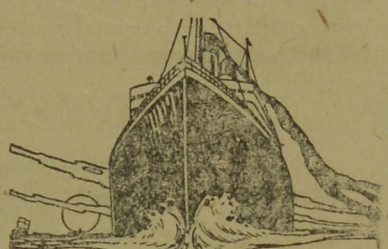

GERMANS SAY THEY OWN ONLY SECRET SERVICE

London, Oct. 20 (by mail).—A venturesome correspondent who succeeded in reaching Berlin a few days ago sends a story of life in the metropolis, which casts interesting sidelights on the German point of view.

The narrative opens with an account of a friendship with the correspondent struck up with a couple of German officers.

"Sitting around a large corner table at the Cafe Furtenhof," continues the writer "with huge glasses of beer in front of us and a good after-dinner cigars the reticence of the two officers melted away.

"Spies," said one of the two young fellows, 'why should we worry about spies? All the men and women, especially women, who were supposed to be spying for Russia in Germany and Austria were playing a double game. Russia were persuaded they were spying for her, and they were really spying for us. A few useless and fantastic reports sent to St. Petersburg (note the name) were good enough to put them in the confidence of generals and archdukes, and so they could get for us very important secrets.

"France never had a secret service worth talking about and the few attempts of Britain in that direction were so clumsily done that it was really pathetic to see how the poor chaps got into trouble for sending home information and plans they could easily have copied from railway maps and tourist books.

"We are the only nation on earth knowing how to organize a secret service."

"You seem proud of your spies," I remarked.

"Spy is a very ridiculous word," he rejoined. "Napoleon had spies; we have informants; They mix with all classes of society, they manage to get everywhere, from the royal palace to the country store, from the barracks canteen to the Premier's house. Be certain that nine-tenths of those who have been arrested as our emissaries in France, Britain and Russia have nothing to do with it, and that most of the real ones are still doing their job and doing it well.

"We know everything that happens in Britain. We know the exact number and destination of troops sent from Britain to the continent; we know of everyone who goes in or out of Britain and also of his business and his intentions."

"Oh, do you?" I could not help exclaiming, as I burst out laughing.

"Yes, we do," he went on, with unshakable firmness. "For instance, we know that Earl Kitchener is struggling to raise his army; that London is in darkness for fear of the Zeppelins; that the King and the royal family have left Buckingham Palace for a small private house afraid of bomb drapping."

"It is really very childish of the British authorities to think that we shall send a lonely airship to drop a few bombs on London. They would not do much harm and they would produce a panic with the result that Kitchener, would, perhaps, get on

WAR HARMLESS TO CANADIAN SHIPPING

Ottawa, Oct. 30—The war has not interfered with the Canadian shipping, according to advices received by the Marine Department.

Steamers of ocean-going register may not be carrying as full cargoes as usual owing to trade conditions but the great bulk of Canadian vessels are engaged in the coastal or lake trade and there are no reports which indicate that they have been laid up.

The security afforded by the British Navy is keeping open all the trade routes and, having regard to the commercial conditions imports and exports continue fairly active.

No Canadian vessel has been captured or seized in home or foreign waters. Some 6,000 ocean-going Canadian vessels enter and clear at Canadian ports every year.

The navy affords security, while the war risk insurance scheme of the British Government proves of the greatest advantage. It is being generally availed of by Canadian shippers, who follow the directions of the Admiralty as to the routes to be taken and the rules to be observed in approaching and leaving ports.

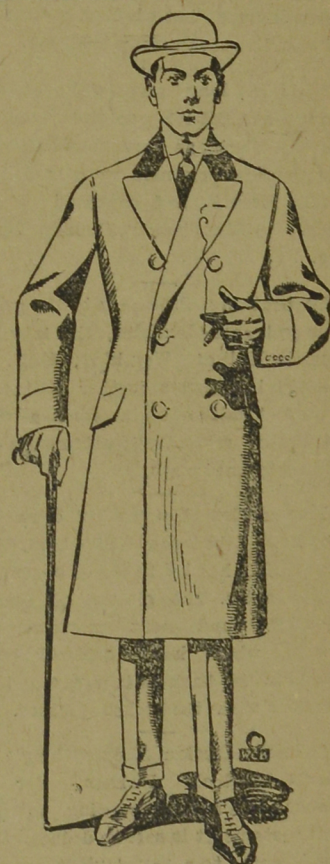
