FOR HOME SERVICE.



71ST BANDSMEN TRAINING WITH HOSPITAL CORPS

Were Disbanded as a Musical Organization Upon Their Arrival at Salisbury Plain—Walter Hanlon Promoted to Sergeant

It is altogether likely that the members of the 71st Regt. Band, who went to England attached to the 12th Battalion of the Fourth Brigade will be among the first Canadians to see active service.

According to letters received here on Saturday the local musicians have been attached to different branches of Army Medical Corps and are now receiving preliminary instructions in hospital work at Salisbury Plain preparatory to leaving for France to assist in looking after the wounded at the front.

Mr. Walter Hanlon, a graduate of the Fredericton High School, has been promoted to the rank of sergeant in the Army Medical Corps, while other members of the band are with stretcher bearer corps and field ambulance corps.

MAYOR MITCHELL GETS REPLY FROM HON. MR. HAZEN

Promises to Bring Fredericton's Advantages for the training of Troops to the Notice of the Authorities at Halifax

It will be remembered that a few days ago Mayor Mitchell, on behalf of the City Council, forwarded a telegram to Hon. J. D. Hazen, acting minister of militia, at Ottawa, requesting that the military buildings in this city be utilized by the government for the mobilization and training of the second expeditionary force. Today His Worship received the following reply from the minister:

Sir:—I am in receipt of your telegram dated 27th inst., and I note your remarks with regard to Fredericton.

I have to inform you, however, that we have deliberately adopted a policy of decentralization and, within reasonable limits, we are leaving it to divisional commanders to carry out the necessary arrangements connected with the mobilization which is now in progress; nevertheless I will not fail to bring to the notice of the officer commanding 6th Division the advantages which Fredericton undoubtedly possesses.
