WHO WILL MARRY MARY?

JUDGEMENT AFFECTS SET- TLERS IN NORTHUMBERLAND

In Case of Mersereau vs Swim Ap-
peal Court Decides Against
Defendant

Judgements were delivered by the
Court of Appeal yesterday afternoon.

KING VS. HUBBARD

Mr. Justice White read judgement
in the case of King vs. Hubbard ex
parte Monahan, a Sunbury Canada
Temperance Act case in which the
defendant's counsel claimed that the
information did not state that the of-
fence was committed in Sunbury
County.

The information under the authori-
ties was the basis of all subsequent
proceedings. It was made in the
adjoining county the information
might be equally valid there. There
must be something to give justice
jurisdiction.

The conviction was quashed.

BUDD VS. JOHNSON

In the case of Budd vs. Johnson
on trespass case tried in Charlotte
County, before Judge McKeown in
which the plaintiff appealed. The
question was whether the land in
question is a public highway or
whether the defendant has a right of
way over it.

The appeal was discussed with costs.

MERSEREAU VS. SWIM

Mr. Justice White read judgement
in the case of Mersereau vs. Swim,
an action of replevin tried in North-
umberland County in June 1913 in
which the court ordered a judgement
for \$150 with leave reserved. The
defendant claimed also not having a
lease, a prescriptive title of over
sixty years against the Crown.

The opinion of court was that the
plaintiff had failed to show such pos-
session as the law requires evidence
of actual open and adverse posses-
sion, constructive possession not being
sufficient. The evidence brought for-
ward was not such as would have
been acceptable to a jury.

The verdict for the defendant was
set aside.

The judgement in this case it is
said will affect a considerable num-
ber of settlers in the Parish of Lud-
low, Northumberland County, who
have been making similar claims
with regard to Crown Lands.

The court adjourned until May 5.

MEXICANS ARE LOYAL

(Continued from Page One.)

Mr. Wilson will affix his signature
probably tomorrow on the volunteer
army bill, providing the machinery
for raising a volunteer army force in
any time of emergency. Estimates
by army officers as to the number of
men the President might call for in
case of war, range from 50,000 and
100,000.

The German vessel which carried
the big shipment of arms, which it
was feared might reach Huerta, has
landed its commercial cargo, but the
captain of the vessel, for reasons of
his own, has not put the ammunition
ashore. There has been no effort on
the part of the United States forces
at Vera Cruz to prevent its landing.

London, April 25—Telegraphing
from Mexico City Thursday, the
correspondent of The Daily Telegraph
says:

"The utmost enthusiasm and devo-
tion for President Huerta was dis-
played by all classes today, and Pre-
sident Wilson's name was greeted
howls of 'Death to the Americans.'"

"Patriotic demonstrations are un-
ceasing. The Indian masses whom
the revolution was driving into anar-
chy, now are offering themselves as
volunteers. Thousands of women
have offered their services for active
defence.

"The concentration of troops to-
ward Vera Cruz is beginning. All
railway services have been suspended
and trains are being employed for
the transport of troops. The sta-
tions along the line of Vera Cruz are
tumultuous encampments.

"The Japanese residents here are
making great demonstrations with
flags and lanterns. They cheered be-
fore the foreign office today and the
foreign minister appeared on a bal-
cony and addressed them, upon the
close union between Mexicans and
Japan.

"A painful impression was caused
by the daring appearance of Mrs.
Nelson O'Shaughnessy, wife of the
American charge, at the wedding to-
day of President Huerta's son. Dur-
ing the ceremony Mrs. O'Shaughnessy
sat immediately behind Senora Huer-
ta and in the procession had the arm
of the commander of the rural guards.
"This morning when Mexico City
awoke, it was surprised to find the
statue of George Washington not on
its pedestal but at the foot of the
statue of Benito Juarez, a national
hero."

FEDERALS DESTROY NUEVO LAREDO

Laredo, Texas, April 24—Nueva
Laredo, the thriving Mexican border
town opposite here, was in ruins to-
day by Mexican federal soldiers who late
night, devastated by dynamite and fire
today began destruction which did
not stop until they were forced to
flee southward before the guns of the
American border patrol.

Two Mexicans are known to have
been killed by the United States
troops and several were seen to fall
when a machine gun from Fort Mc-
Intosh got into action.

Property damage in Nueva Laredo
will reach about \$500,000.

Among the buildings destroyed
were the United States consulate,
municipal building, post office, theatre,
the flour mill, one of the largest in
this section; the railroad shops of
the Mexican National railway, and
other smaller structures.

MONTEREY IN REBELS' HANDS

Brownsville, Texas, April 24—"Mon-
terey is in the hands of the Consti-
tutionalists, after a five days' battle"
was an official announcement made
late today from the Constitutional-
ist headquarters at Matamoros, ac-
companied by the ringing of bells at
outburst of rebel enthusiasm through-
out the city.

REFUGEES RAACH VERA CRUZ

Vera Cruz, April 24—Thomas B.
Hohler, the British charge, who had
charge of the train which brought the
refugees from the capital here last
night, intending to return to the cap-
ital tonight.

The British cruiser Hermione which,
although a neutral vessel, has been
engaged in the removal of Americans
from Tampico, reports that only a
few are now there.

The cable office here is being taxed
to its fullest capacity with official
commercial and press despatches. C.
Mitchell, manager of the operating
force, is working day and night to
move the business. In some cases
his men have had no sleep for more
than thirty-six hours.

THINKS MEXICANS WILL UNITE.

Toronto, April 24—Charge Alga-
ra of the Mexican embassy at Washing-
ton, arrived at Toronto shortly be-
fore ten o'clock tonight and took up
his quarters in the King Edward
hotel. A large amount of correspon-
dence was awaiting him.

Tired from his journey, the Mexi-
can representative declined to give a
lengthy interview, but stated that in
his opinion all Mexicans, Federals
and Constitutionalists alike, would
unite against any attempt of inva-
sion by the United States.
