COUNCIL AWAITS
ORDER OF COURT
FOR INVESTIGATION

Judgement by Supreme Court That Mayorality Election Must be Investigated---Inquiry Confined to Grounds of Protest

The judgment read by Chief Justice McLeod of the Appeal Court yesterday afternoon in the Fredericton mayorality Election Case directs the City Council to hold an investigation into the grounds alleged by ex-Ald. W. E. Farrell in the protest filed by him with the city clerk on the night of the election. The council now awaits an order from the court and upon receiving the same will make arrangements for holding the investigation.

The judgment was that a rule absolute be granted that the council hold an investigation into the election but that the investigation be confined to the grounds mentioned in the protest filed within two hours after the declaration of the election of Moses Mitchell. The judgment stated further that as counsel had acted in good faith and in the public interest, there would be no costs allowed.

The chief justice in the judgment, also said that the contention of the city's counsel that a specific statement of the grounds of protest should have been made within two hours of the declaration of the poll had not been upheld by the court, which held that as the candidate had no representatives in the polling-booths some latitude should be allowed him.

DEFINITION OF ILLEGALITY.

Under the judgment the City Council must pass upon the legality or illegality of the ballots, the ground in ex-Ald. Farrell's protest of March

IN TRAIN WRECK

In Accident on Way to Her Home---Right Arm Injured---Will Sail for Canada on June 7th

The Countess of Ashburnham formerly Miss Maria Anderson of Fredericton was injured recently in a train wreck in England. Her Grace suffered severely from the shock and from fright and had her right arm painfully hurt. A letter received recently by Miss Lucy Anderson from her sister the Countess describes the circumstances of the accident. The Countess accompanied by her maid was travelling from London to Battle, Sussex, near which is Ashburnham Place. Railway accidents are not so numerous in Great Britain as on this side of the Atlantic but the train in this case was derailed and its passengers much shaken up although no person was fatally injured. The Countess in her letter describes the screams of the female passengers, the screams of the female passengers and the fright experienced by all. Both the Countess and her maid were thrown about and injured to some extent. At the time of writing Her Grace had sufficiently recovered to be able to use her arm.

The letter states further that the Earl and Countess will sail from Liverpool for Canada on June 7, on their way to Fredericton to spend the summer. They will be warmly greeted.

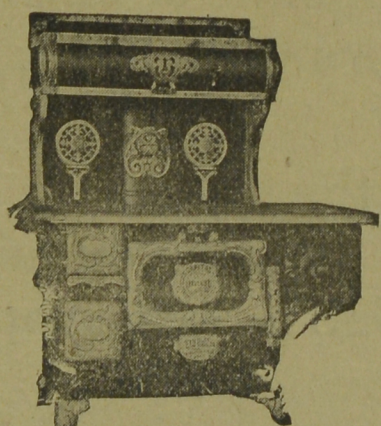

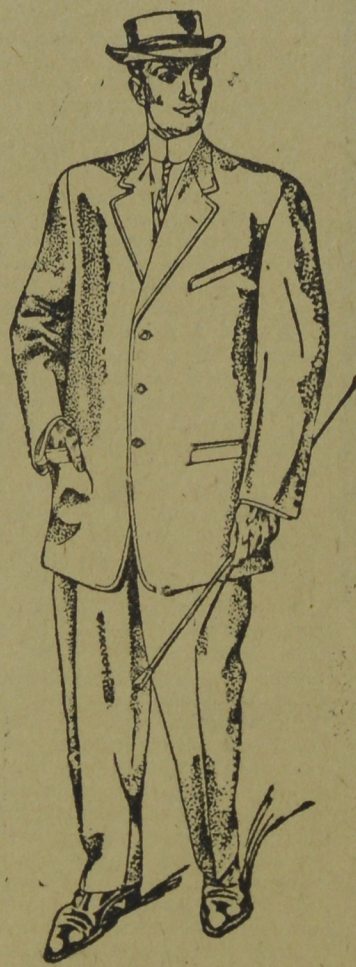
