THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

The provincial elections in Ontario yesterday resulted in the return of the Whitney government by a substantial majority. Mr. Rowell, the Liberal leader, put up a magnificent fight against tremendous odds. He had eighteen followers in the last house and it looks as if he would have close to thirty in the next legislature. His platform of "Abolish the Bar" won for him the support of many clergymen and moral reform workers, while on the other hand it was the means of arraying the liquor vote solidly against him. The issue was put squarely up to the people, and a majority of them decided to return Sir James Whitney to power and retain the open bar. The biggest surprise of the day was the election of two Liberals in Ottawa right under the nose of the Borden government. The defeat of Hon. Dr. Reaume, minister of public works in Windsor, was another knock-down blow for the government.

The result of the election shows clearly that it is not easy to stampede the people away from their party affiliations on the temperance issue. As the late Israel Tarte once pointed out, elections are not won by prayers and it is quite evident that in Ontario yesterday a great many thousands of Tories did not vote as they pray. In Sir John Macdonald's time the liquor interests in Ontario were strong enough to secure representation in the dominion cabinet and the fact that Sir Robert Borden recently elevated an Ontario distiller to the senate, taken along with the result of yesterday's election, indicates that the long standing alliance between Toryism and the liquor interests is not in any imminent danger of being broken.

Mr. Dugal's questions in the Legislature last session and the publication by the Liberal press of the agreement entered into by the Public Works Department with Concrete Constructions, Limited, seems to have served a good purpose. The agreement has been cancelled and the company has been given to understand that so far as New Brunswick is concerned there is nothing doing. The people of New Brunswick owe much to the noble county of Madawaska.

The girls of the Fredericton High School seem to have carried all before them this year. In the graduating class of seventeen the name of only one boy appeared and he contented himself by graduating in first division. All the medals and prizes went to members of the fair sex. Outnumbering the boys sixteen to one, it is not surprising that the girls helped themselves to everything in sight.

The public schools of the city closed today and upwards of thirteen hundred little men and women and their teachers have been turned loose for a well earned vacation. Fredericton is proud of its public school system and well it might be. We have a splendid Board of Trustees, a capable staff of teachers, and fine school buildings, and good value is given for the taxpayers for educational purposes.

The local hack organ says that Commodore Stewart, M.P.P., was elected as a supporter of Premier Fleming. The hack organ is mistaken. The Commodore was elected as an independent, and defeated a member of the government ticket. The fact that the Commodore was unable to see his way clear to support the Fleming government, shows that he is a man of good judgment.

CANCER OFTEN DUE TO DIET OF MEAT

Atlantic City, N. J., June 28.—Over-eating, especially of meats, and the excessive use of alcohol and coffee, causes many cancers and the only hope for their extinction lies in absolute subsistence on vegetables, with the exclusion of coffee and alcohol in conjunction with proper medical measures. This, in substance, was the statement made yesterday by Dr. L. Duncan Bulkley, of New York, in an address before the American Medical Association. "It is a recognized fact," he said, "that cancerous tissues develop and maintained by nutrition derived from food and drink and that tumors certainly grow by the same means. I have treated many cases of cancer by a vegetarian diet, excluding coffee and alcohol with remarkable results." He pointed out that cancer victims who lived directly on products of the soil.

About 90 per. cent. of the fibroid tumors can be cured or relieved by the use of radium, according to Dr. Howard Kelly of Johns Hopkins University. "Operations are unnecessary," he said. His new treatment with radium offers a wonderful new and undreamed of hope for thousands of women suffering with tumors.

1856—Jenny Lind gave a farewell concert in London.

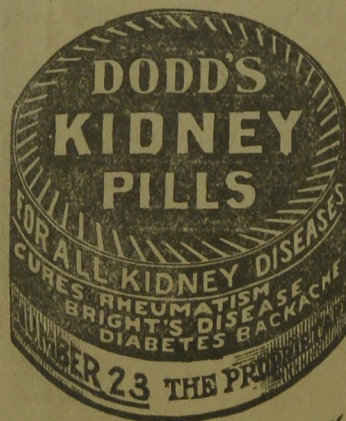
1876—Opening of the first railway in China—from Shanghai to Kang-wan.
