Opp City Hall**CHURCH ENLISTS "MOVIES"
TO SHOW MISSION WORK**

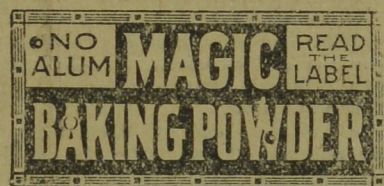

Missions in the movies are the lat-
est thing in church work. Three men
will sail for the Far East on April
16 with an elaborate equipment to
take motion pictures of mission scen-
es. Ten years ago a premature at-
tempt to do something of the sort
was made by what is now the Mission-
ary Education Movement, but the
work was not well done, the pictures
were not taken by an expert and the
films were a failure. The British
missionary societies have had succes-
ses in illustrating some of their mis-
sions by this method.The men behind the plan is Charles
A. Rowland, chairman of the Lay-
man's Movement of the Southern
Presbyterian Church and a member of
the executive committee of Foreign
Missions of that denomination. Ac-
companied by Dr. J. P. McCallie, he
starts on a tour of inspection of
missions in the Far East next month.
In order to assure the highest grade
of pictures they are to be accompa-
nied by Louis A. Holman, the assis-
tant art editor of The Youth's Com-
panion, who also is a photographic
expert.Mission work in action will be re-
corded in all its phases by the moving
pictures, hospital scenes, the great
mission schools in class-room work
and in athletics, chapel scenes, street
preaching and itinerating will all be
recorded on several miles of film.

BEING EYES TO GIVERS.

The possibilities of the mission pic-
ture in missionary education are
rather obvious. Certain phases ap-
peal most forcibly to those who best
know the subject. Thus it is the
plan of the Rowland party to repre-
sent—in its entirety and many-sided-
ness—the work of one complete mis-
sion station. They have chosen the
station at Kiang Yin, China, which
is wholly supported by the First Pres-
byterian Church of Wilmington, N.
C. Not only does the money for this
mission come from the Wilming-
ton church but many of the mission-
aries have been sent by the church.
In addition to the hospital and the
school and evangelistic work of this
particular mission, the city and its
surroundings, and the homes and
daily life of the missionaries will be
caught for the benefit primarily of
the Wilmington church. Of course,
these films will be of general educa-
tional value.There is more to missions than
street preaching. This expedition
plans to show the background of mis-
sion work by the most vivid possible
representation of heathenism. They
will show the great temples of the
East, the pilgrims and processions
and festivals and the people in the
act of worshipping the idols.Because of the official relation of
the party to the missionary cause,
they will have expert assistance in
obtaining the most intimate views of
the life of the east. Missionaries of
all names will be interested in finding
some new way of telling their story
to the people in the home land.

PICTURES FOR THE CHURCHES.

Primarily the present expedition to
the Orient is to obtain films for pro-
paganda purposes for use in the
churches and in religious conventions.
Some of the reels will deal with the
more strictly technical side of mis-
sions that interest only the church
people. Thus Southern Presbyterians
will be permitted to see the faces of
their own missionaries at work on
their fields. Mr. Rowland reports
that a new form of moving picture
machine has recently been marketed
which makes it possible for the aver-
age church or Sunday School to use
the ordinary films that are sold
through the commercial houses.His plan is to send a set of these
machines and the picture taken in theOrient through the denomination. The
operation and the addresses to ac-
company the pictures will be in the
hands of the mission in the local
presbyteries.The latest method of propaganda—
already successfully tried out in the
Southern Presbyterian Church—is to
have the missionary committee of
each presbytery to each church of
the presbytery with a stereopticon
showing mission scenes. The execu-
tive committee of foreign missions
owns half a dozen stereopticons and
many sets of slides and keeps these in
constant operation. In addition as
many more machines are owned by
the presbyteries. This, of course, is
carrying the propaganda straight
down into the normal life and work
of every congregation. The plan pays
for itself, so that the executive com-
mittee has had no cost in the matter.
Now the plan is to supplement the
stereopticon in this work by the
moving pictures.Mr. Rowland says that most of the
pictures taken will be useful to all
denominations and his church will co-
operate with the churches in utilizing
the pictures taken by Mr. Holman.
Apparently this is a first subject in
an entirely new form of missionary
appeal. The insistent urging of
money as a basis of missionary ad-
dresses has been overdone. A new
avenue of approach to the churches
and if education has become absolute-
ly necessary.AWAKENING DOR-
MANT CHURCHES.Within five years the Southern
Presbyterian denomination has multi-
plied its missionary gifts. It has now
an annual foreign mission budget of
which more than half is given by less
than one hundred and fifty congrega-
tions. The balance of that sum is
chiefly given by less than half of the
denomination's three thousand churches;
that is to say a mere handful
of churches bear the heavy end of
the denomination's financial load.
Practically all of the giving is done
by something under half of the total
number of churches. The problem is
to shake up the other one thousand
five hundred uninterested churches.**WORCESTER TEAM PRACTICES
