MacLean, Mooney and Mainmann Liable According to Halifax Echo--Another Bulletin of Warning Issued by M. P. B. A. A. U. of Canada--Will Enforce Rules

Fred MacLean, Pete Mooney and Dan (Sic) Mainmann, three students of U.N.B. will be suspended at once, for playing hockey with professionals last week. Last Tuesday night these three men played with the Fredericton team against Marysville in the final fixture of the New Brunswick professional hockey league. It has been claimed for them that they had the permission of Mr. Covey of St. John, one of the representatives of the M.P.A.A.A.

When President Gastonguay was seen this morning by a representative of the Echo he said that it did not make any difference to him if Mr. Covey did give them permission to play, the fact will be in their favor for reinstatement. But if he did not, they will be professionalized.

The attention of Amateur Clubs

in the Maritime Provinces is called to certain provisions in the By-laws of the A.A.U. of C. which state that all leagues affiliated with the Union or professing to be purely amateur leagues must consist of teams whose members are registered amateurs. In view of this fact and for the protection of bona fide athletes who play the game for sport only, notice is given that application must be made to the branch secretary by the President of each league for sanction and the Secretaries of all amateur clubs are requested to forward applications, properly signed and attested (which can be obtained from the undersigned on application) by the players on their various teams, otherwise clubs or individual members thereof render themselves liable to suspension as do those who also take part in any game on a team or playing against a team consisting of professional players or players having no cards.

It is to be hoped that the officials of the various clubs in these Provinces will so assist this branch of the Union that it will not be necessary to take any such drastic measures.

### CHARLIE GANZEL DEAD AFTER LONG BASEBALL CAREER

Death Caused by Cancer--Former Boston National Catcher--Facts of His Long Record

Quincy, April 7--Charlie Ganzel, oldtime ball player, died at midnight tonight at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Pawsey of 332 Billings Road, Norfolk Downs, after a long illness of cancer.

Last winter many old baseball players who played with him started a fund for him and several thousand dollars were contributed.

Charles Ganzel, the former Boston National Club catcher, was born in Waterford, Wis., June 18, 1862. His first professional engagement was with the Minneapolis club in 1884, as first baseman and change catcher. While there he caught Carruthers, formerly of Brooklyn.

In 1885 Ganzel signed with the Philadelphia club and made his debut in the National League. Manager Harry Wright engaged him as a catcher and he remained with Philadelphia that season and part of 1886.

In 1886 he was purchased by the Detroit club. He was not long with Detroit before he showed a marked improvement in his work. He was a fine thrower and had a wonderful reach.

Owing to an injury to Bennett during 1886, which necessitated his retirement, Ganzel caught to the entire satisfaction of the management. He played with Detroit in 1888. In November of that year he, Richardson, Dan Brouters and Bennett were sold to the Boston National Club for \$25,000.

That was the largest sum paid up to that time for four players and Boston obtained plenty of good advertising as well as four players who being head-liners in the National game.

I was in the fall of 1888 that they came to Boston. Ganzel remained with Boston for nine years. He then went into business for himself. He continued playing ball with strong independent teams around New England now and then coaching teams.

### JIMMY CLABBY LEAVES FOR AUSTRALIA

San Francisco, April 7--Jimmy Clabby of Hammond, Ind., the middleweight pugilist, left suddenly today with his manager for Australia on the liner Ventura. He said he had agreed to fight three bouts in the Antipodes.

Clabby's trip will not effect his status as a probationer of the Los Angeles Police Court, where he is under suspended sentence of three years as a result of a street brawl in which a policeman was severely beaten. Police Judge White, that city gave Clabby permission to go to Australia when the pugilist represented that he was going to fulfill engagements and that he would return soon.

Stevt Ketchel and Joe Walling, Chicago lightweights, and Johnny Schiff, Los Angeles, a featherweight, went with Clabby.

capacity was double that quantity. Why, under these circumstances, should the miller object to more markets for his product?

"Today," he continued, "we have the opportunity of getting the American market for our wheat and flour. The man who produces the wheat wants this opportunity seized, but the government refuses to act."

### NO HELP FOR THE CONSUMER.

Why, asked Mr. MacLean, had the minister of finance nothing to say regarding a tariff policy on foodstuffs? The question of the high cost of living was one of great importance, engaging consideration of all the people of Canada, with the exception of the government. What remedy could be applied by way of tariff reduction? The existing conditions pressed on the consumer and strange to say, did not carry to the producer a corresponding advantage.

"What can be done?" asked Mr. MacLean. "Is taxation on foodstuffs a just taxation? Is there any justification for continuing it? Does it really benefit any one?"

Such taxation should be removed. The guiding principle should be to give Canadian consumers their food free from taxation and cease trying to drive Canadian trade in foodstuffs across a continent.

Hon. Mr. White, said Mr. MacLean, had talked rubbish when he stated that free food meant free trade. Many people in Canada would retort: "Well, if it does, what does it matter?" Such theories were part of the high protectionist doctrine. Protection was advanced to "aid infant industries," but the industry seventy-five years old seemed to want it as much as the newly born industry. In consideration of the economic conditions in the country, the high cost of living the extremely high prices of the actual necessities of life, that the consumer was suffering from and the producer secured no real advantage from the tariff, he believed the government had been recreant to its trust and responsibility in not grappling fearlessly and faithfully with the problem. Liberalism stood for placing foodstuffs on the free list. This was the right side of the question, it was the economic side, it was the human side.

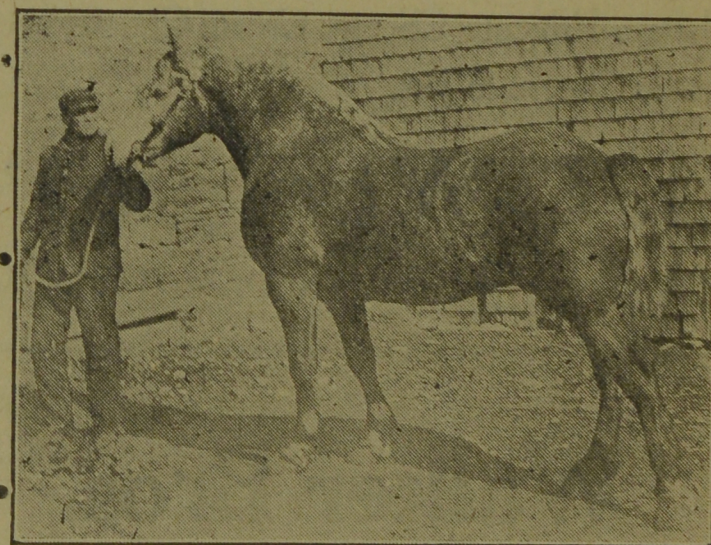
