**HEAVY RAIN ACCOMPANIED BY LOW TEMPERATURE**

Total Precipitation was 1.6 Inches--- Effect on Snow Has Not Been Marked---Warmer Weather Expected to Follow

The storm which began yesterday with a fall of snow changing later into rain resulted in a total precipitation of one and six-tenths inches. According to the data furnished from the meteorological station at the University of New Brunswick nine-tenths of an inch, including two inches of snow was the precipitation yesterday and that today was seven tenths. The average temperature during the storm however was only 35 degrees above zero. The cold rain has had little effect upon the snow, but as warm weather is expected to follow there should be a marked change shortly. The lower river is reported to be open as far as Carter's Point, but above that place the ice is solid. On the Kennedecasis and other branches the ice is also solid. At this time last year navigation was in full swing on all parts of the river. This year it will be the middle of April at the earliest before the river is clear.

The heavy rainfall yesterday caused the usual inconveniences about the city on account of choked catch-basins and surface sewers. The intersection of Carleton and Brunswick Streets was flooded to a considerable depth on account of the surface sewer on Carleton St. being broken at its outlet at the Highway Bridge.

Reports from the headwaters of the river are that there is upwards of five feet of snow and that the drives on the streams and main river should come out without trouble. Hauling is still good in most sections of the country.

**CONVICTION MADE IN THIRD OFFENSE SCOTT ACT CASE**

Sequel of Raid on City Hotel March 11---Case Against Lorne Hotel Adjudged Till Monday Next

A conviction for a third offence against the Canada Temperance Act was made by Police Magistrate John L. Marsh this morning against the proprietor of the City Hotel. The case against the Lorne Hotel which is charged with a third offence was adjourned until Monday morning, next when sentence will be pronounced on the City Hotel case. These cases are understood to be the beginning of a general campaign for Scott Act enforcement. Conviction of a third offence is punishable by a jail sentence.

No appearance was made by the defendant in the case against the City Hotel. R. B. Hanson, city solicitor appeared for the Crown, Chief of Police McCollom, Detective Roberts and Policeman Marshall were called as witnesses and told of the search at the City Hotel on the morning of March 11 when a considerable quantity of liquor was secured by the police. Conviction was made by the magistrate who also granted the application of Mr. Hanson for an order for the destruction of the seized liquor which is stored in the police station.

J. B. Dickson appeared for P. A. Guthrie, M. P. P., counsel for the defence in the Lorne Hotel case and applied for adjournment till Monday morning. The application was granted.

During the course of the case His Honor said he did not want too long adjournment as the case might be carried out of his term of office.

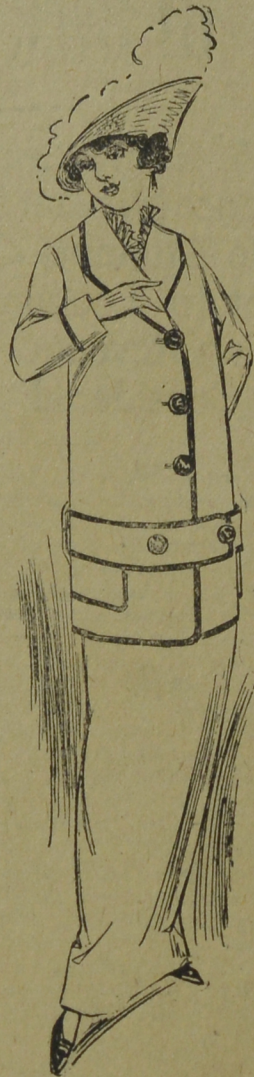
