SCOTLAND YARD CHIEF GOES INTO RETIREMENT

Scotland Yard, London's famous police centre, is mourning the retirement of Chief Superintendent Frank Forest. English criminals do not share this regret, for during an exciting official career of twenty-five years Mr. Forest has won an international reputation as a powerful foe of the evildoer.

The retiring chief of the criminal investigation department might be a prosperous stock broker, an ironmaster, a schoolmaster, a church warden—anything but a detective. He is a shortish, stocky man, with the shoulders of Hercules and a (Jack) Johnsonian fist. His eminently practical cranium is always so closely shaven that you can never quite tell where the baldness ends and the hair begins.

The slight Mephistophelian cock of his eyebrows suggests both shrewdness and a sense of humor, and his eyes are small—but absolute girdlets for penetration. The grip of his hand-shake is a vivid index of the power of the man behind it.

There you have a snapshot of Frankie, as he is known to his familiars.

As for his dress, it is immaculate, from the glossy crown and the aristocratic curl of his silo hat to the shine of his patent leather boots.

Superintendent Forest began at the bottom rung of the ladder. He came out of the west country very young and very enthusiastic to be a policeman in that aromatic and tumultuous district of London known as Saffron Hill. He had been in the force something like five minutes when he was stabbed by an Italian in an attempt to rescue an Englishman out of a street brawl.

Thanks to his tremendous strength he got his man out of the mess safe and sound. Then he woke up—in a hospital ward. After his recovery he was sent with Littlechild to Ireland during Fenian troubles of '82; next to Paris for a year, where he learned many useful things, and then later to America, where he was "borrowed" twice by the American government.

In the States he had stirring adventures. For weeks he was on the trail of a notorious train robber who in turn tracked him and afterward followed him to London with a huge six shooter and the cheerful object of "blowing daylight" through him. Another interesting American adventure was a long fought duel of wits between Frank Forest and Winford Moore, a gentleman who netted many thousands by his ingenious manipulation of a series of "next of kin" swindles.

Moore's bait was an alluring sum of millions awaiting next of kin claimants in England. He found the "claimants" in America, bled them of everything and then vanished. He was eventually rematerialized by the wily Mr. Forest, and his schemes had been so craftily laid that it took three trials and three juries to convict him. Moore was a lawyer in Tennessee at the time this bright idea struck him. He was also the pastor of a church—and an Englishman! His ultimate reward was nine years' imprisonment.


Illustrative of Forest's good nature the following story may be told. Many years ago two American detectives chanced to be in London together, awaiting the extradition of criminals who had been arrested in England for offences committed in the United States. The Hotel Victoria was then American headquarters in London and one evening the two hawshaws, who had a convivial day, fell asleep side by side on a divan in the big smoking room of the hostelry. An American humorist found a pair of handcuffs in the office of the manager of the hotel, and proceeded to shackle the pair together, when for two or three hours they slumbered peacefully while the guests of the hotel, American and English, including the ladies, came to gaze upon the scene.

When the detectives finally awakened about one o'clock in the morning, it was impossible to find a key to the handcuffs and hence impossible to liberate them. They would not hear of sending to a police station for assistance, lest the story of their ridiculous plight get out, but they had confidence that Forest, who was then a plain detective inspector, would not betray them. A messenger to Scotland Yard, near by, learned that Forest had gone home long before, but got his address, several miles away in the suburbs. An American newspaper man who knew Forest reached his home by cab after two o'clock in the morning. He was awakened from slumber and without protest came all the way to the Victoria and released his fellow craftsmen.

Forest is known to every American who has ever had to call on the police in London, for his detail before he became chief inspector was to cover the hotels most frequented by Americans and after he became chief inspector he generally attended in person on occasions when citizens of the republic needed assistance from Scotland Yard.

Albany, Oct. 16—The programme of this the second day of the exercises in connection with the dedication of the New York State Education Building, included addresses by such noted educators as President Charles M.
