PATRIOTIC HARANGUE BY JUDGE TO JURORS

(Montreal Herald)

The November term of the Court of King's Bench which is the shortest of the year on account of the holidays which precede Christmas time making it advisable to move the date forward one month, convened this morning with His Lordship Mr. Justice St. Pierre presiding.

The morning was devoted to the empanelling of a Grand Jury, which was accomplished before the noon recess. His Lordship delivering his address which had the usual necessary admonitions to the men chosen to render their verdicts on the evidence produced, and not to bring with them to the jury room a biased mind.

A remarkable exhortation for courage and confidence in the allied armies to withstand the terrible strains of war and to carry the banner of victory through the campaign, was delivered by His Lordship, himself a soldier who fought through the civil war on the side of the North-

army. He knows whereof he speaks, when he used the words destruction, carnage and death, for he spent two years on the battlefield and for twelve months was a prisoner of war at the Andersonville prison. He said this morning that he was made of stuff that wouldn't down, for he was taken from the field of battle a supposed dead soldier, but he lived long enough to be liberated from the southern prison, one year after his incarceration.

His message to the jury contained the following apt words on the present war situation. "We are actually in the midst of great execution and corruption. The Mother Country and her Allies are assailed by two powerful enemies. If these succeed in their endeavor to destroy Great Britain, not only would she be silenced, but her colonies would be crushed under the heels of merciless conquerors. Militarism would take the place of what we now possess, and institu-

SIXTH VIOLENT DEATH IN CANADIAN FORCE

Salisbury, Oct. 30—Private Albert Smith of the Montreal Highlanders, was killed by a fall from a wagon, making the sixth violent death in the Canadian expeditionary force since its arrival in England. There are no deaths yet among the Ontario men. Wet weather retards the training. There have been no manoeuvres yet.

The King and Queen and Lord Kitchener have expressed their intention of visiting the Canadian troops shortly. Lord Roberts, Earl Grey, Lord Deces, the inspector general of the British Artillery, and other notables have already inspected the contingent. Lord Roberts declares that the Canadians are a magnificent force. Colonel Victor Williams, commandant at Valcartier, has been appointed commandant here under General Alderson.

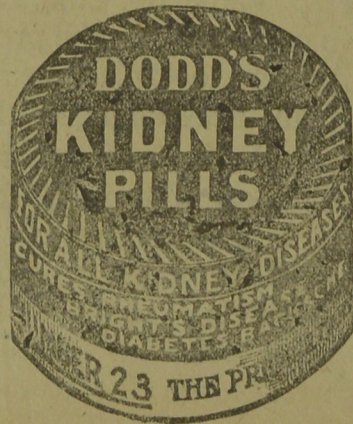

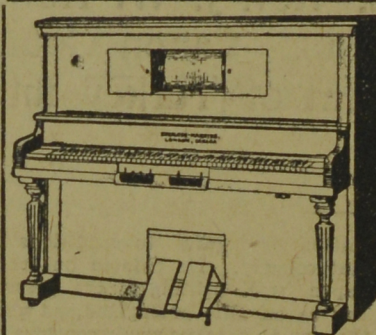
