WILL RECEIVE FULL CLAIM

FREDERICTON BOY A MIDSHIPMAN ON THE GOOD HOPE

Victor Hatheway, Son of F. W. Hatheway of This City Was in, Great Sea Fight--Anxiety as to His Safety

Victor Hatheway, son of Mr. F. W. Hatheway, of this city, is a midshipman on His Majesty's cruiser, Good Hope, which was engaged in the naval battle off the coast of Chile on Sunday and his relatives here are naturally anxious as to his safety. The despatches say that the Good Hope, which was the flagship of the squadron, was set on fire and last seen was heading for the shore. If she was successful in reaching shore the crew or or perhaps part of it may have been saved. Until definite word is received from the admiralty, however, there will be great anxiety for the safety of Mr. Hatheway and several other Canadian boys who were known to have been on the British ships.

Mr. Hatheway graduated from the Halifax Naval College two years ago and has since been serving with the British navy. He spent several weeks at his home here last summer on furlough and at the outbreak of the war went to Halifax and joined the Cruiser Berwick. He was subsequently transferred to the Good Hope and sent to South American waters. Midshipman Hatheway was keenly interested in the work of the navy and looked forward to a life on the sea.

Mr. F. W. Hatheway when seen this morning seemed to be very anxious in regard to the safety of his son. He said that there was no doubt about Victor being a member of the crew of the Good Hope and when last heard from was off the coast of Chile. Mr. Hatheway has another son, Harold W. with the Canadian force at Salisbury Plain.
