LOCAL GREEKS  
ARE ANXIOUS TO  
FIGHT THE TURKS

Two Plan to Leave as Soon as War is Declared--Orders to Stop Recruiting at the Military Depot Received

Local Greeks are preparing to go home to fight in the event of Greece becoming involved in the present war which is altogether likely should Turkey decide to enter the conflict.

According to Grecian laws every subject over twenty-one years of age must take up arms in time of war or pay a penalty of five hundred francs, which amounts to about \$20 in our money. A much heavier penalty is imposed upon militiamen and reservists who do not join their colors after orders are issued for the general mobilization of the army.

James Apostolos and Nicholas Aliolis, two members of the local Greek colony, saw active service during the Balkan war. The former was to the front with one of the Greek infantry regiments while Aliolis served as a sailor on one of the torpedo boats.

OFFICIAL ORDERS RECEIVED.

Official orders to stop recruiting men for overseas service were received here yesterday afternoon but Major W. H. Gray, the officer commanding the 71st Regt., is endeavoring to make arrangements so that the volunteers now at the Military Depot can immediately proceed to Valcartier.

The work of recruiting the 71st Regt. to its full strength is going along steadily and the nominal list of those enlisting for home defence is to be handed to the officer commanding on Saturday, Sept. 5th. It is expected that as soon as the list is forwarded to Halifax that orders will be issued to have the regiment placed in barracks.

NEW BRUNSWICK  
WILL MAKE A  
GIFT OF POTATOES

One Hundred Thousand Bushels to be Presented to the Imperial Government by This Province--Valley Ry. Matters Discussed

The Province of New Brunswick will contribute one hundred thousand bushels of potatoes to the imperial government. This decision was reached by the local government at a meeting last evening, after the matter had been fully discussed with the military authorities at Ottawa. Various suggestions had been made as to the form New Brunswick's contribution should take but it was felt by the executive that a gift of potatoes, which are grown in large quantities in this province, especially in the Counties of York, Carleton and Victoria, would be the most feasible. It is generally admitted that New Brunswick tubers are the best in Canada and it is felt that the gift will be satisfactory to the imperial government. New Brunswick was the first province in Canada to propose a gift to the empire in the present crisis.

The executive held a meeting last evening and disposed of the business of the session. Acting Premier Clark remained here to attend to some departmental matters and to see if something could not be done to straighten out matters in connection with Valley Railway finances. This morning he was in consultation with Mr. Ross Thompson, but what transpired has not been made public. The war has made things bad for railway company and contractors.

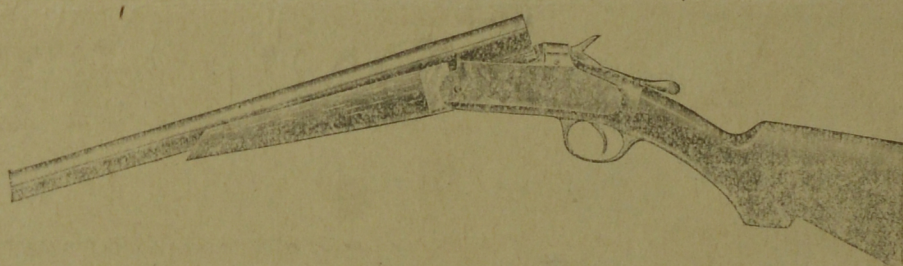
