Calls on People to Unite
For Good Government

Hon. C. W. Robinson, in his speech at the Carvell-Dugal banquet here on Thursday evening, said in part:

"The attention not only of the people of this province but of the whole of Canada has been called to the methods employed by the premier in dealing with the administration of the crown lands and railway construction. Mr. Dugal, who compelled the investigation, and Mrs. Carvell, who ably conducted it on behalf of Mr. Dugal, deserve the hearty commendation of the people of this province."

"It requires a fair amount of courage to assume the responsibility of such charges as Mr. Dugal made in the face of such an overwhelmingly hostile legislature. Much has been revealed by the witnesses who have testified and more can be imagined as withheld by the conspicuous absence of witnesses and documentary evidence."

"The attitude of the government has not indicated any burning zeal to assist in cleaning up the Augean stables. The whole matter is an indelible blot upon the fair escutcheon of our province. Comments of independent journals refer to it as a provincial matter and a deplorable condition of politics peculiar to New Brunswick. No distinction is apparently made in the eyes of such papers as The Canadian Courier of Toronto, between nominal Premier Fleming and Acting Premier Clarke, or any other New Brunswick politician. We are all classed alike as the New Brunswick brand—the lowest, most despised brand on the political market."

"The other members of the government seem to have simultaneously suffered from a stroke of paralysis. Many of them are known to be heartily ashamed of the situation. Hundreds of their former supporters throughout the country are strong in their condemnation. The indifference and the balky-horse attitude of the acting premier and other members of the executive during the whole course of the investigation have condemned them individually and collectively in the eyes of the public. There are among them, no doubt, some good men but they are all in the same cataplectic state. Some microbes have apparently infected them all with the same disease."

the best men be chosen for political office and not the self-seeking, noisy persons who crowd forward with a liberal use of their elbows and push into the background those who are their superiors in everything that goes to make for good citizenship and good government.

"I do not think that any great reformation can come about without a general provincial election and the sooner it comes the better. To ensure a better representation of the best citizens in our legislative halls, I personally am in favor of a complete change in our constituencies. I believe the plan once promulgated by Mr. Hazen but afterwards abandoned by him has in the main many advantages. I refer to the division of the whole province into ridings, each electing one member and giving as far as possible a proportionate number of electors to each riding. Some where about forty members ought to be enough for the whole assembly."

"I would also suggest that management of the crown lands be made as far as possible independent of political influence. It would not be a difficult matter so to arrange this important department that all lumbermen shall receive equal and fair treatment and I am sure that most if not all of the lumbermen of this province would prefer to deal with the government in a strictly honest and straightforward manner, having the stampage so adjusted that the provinces will not be deprived of the fair and just revenue and the operator will not be at the mercy of the dishonest and unscrupulous officials. I have faith in the present deputy of the crown land office and many other capable officials of different departments. I believe they will administer affairs honestly if given a fair opportunity."

"Our financial situation was probably never so strained as at the present time. The liability direct and indirect has been enormously increased during the reign of the present administration. We will soon be in urgent need of the assistance of our most prudent and conservative financial minds if we are to carry the load of added interest charges, defaulted bonds upon which we are the guarantors and the constantly increasing needs of the many public services."

HOW TO SUCCEED.

If we are to succeed in our efforts we must throw wide the doors and invite to our councils the assistance of all good citizens. We must invite the co-operation of the press as far as possible.

"We must expect determined opposition from that part of our press which is shackled to the chariots of the old party managers, but if we go forward undaunted by obstacles and criticism and keep before us at all times right principles and endeavor to select the best citizens as our standard-bearers I firmly believe that our efforts will at length be crowned with success. I still have faith in the public, if we trust them and strive by our actions and our principles to prove that we are in earnest and honestly striving for the uplifting of the standards of political life. If we enter into this work honestly and endeavor to leave to our younger generation

SEVEREST FIGHTING OF WAR.

Petrograd, Dec. 4.—The newspapers here are beginning to print numerous fragmentary accounts derived from the wounded, of the recent fighting in Poland. The general impression from all sides is that the Vistula and Warthe fighting has been incomparably more severe than anything experienced before during the war on any front. The Germans in the early conflict termed it the imperial battle for they had been impressed by the highest authority that upon their success depended the whole future of the war, and as a reward for their successes they were promised that they would be disbanded from their homes. The character of the fighting also compelled the Germans to rely for once upon their manhood instead of their machinery; yet they still persist in their massed formations against rifle, Maxim or Vickers, and their losses have been appalling beyond anything experienced elsewhere. Experts estimate that the Germans have lost two-thirds of their army in Poland.

There were several critical moments during the fighting north of Lodz. One Russian division held its ground against two German army corps and finally drove them back. But for the late arrival of one Russian army corps the battle would have finished in a complete victory a week ago. The strategic position meant annihilation

or surrender had all gone right. As it was, large numbers of Germans got out of the trap and the subsequent fighting has been a curious tactical spectacle with Russians and Germans in alternate strips covering a considerable area of the Polish battlefield. The Germans have alternated furious attacks with retreats and the amount of information vouchsafed us is insufficient to understand exactly how final success will be obtained.

If there was one point besides their war machinery upon which the Germans particularly prided themselves it was their marching powers. Yet even here the Russians have shown them selves immeasurably superior. The grand duke officially noted a while ago that some Russian army corps had marched and fought continuously for months taken fortified positions and covered over 600 miles, and the Russians do their marching flat foot whereas the German roars are made by means of motor traction.

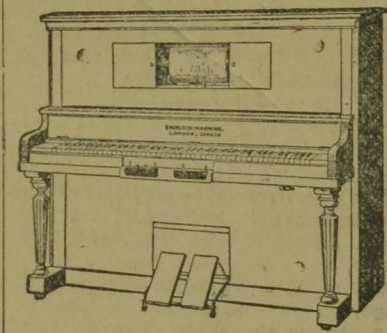
Over the Polish roads in the autumn season the Germans found their methods badly handicapped whereas the Russians continuously improved their records as the men got more and more hardened. One corps covered twenty miles one day and thirty miles the next, and went into the fight on their arrival with an ardor superior to that of the attacking Germans, who had the worst of it.

A YOUNG PATRIOT.

Montreal Star.—A short time ago, Collette Charrier, a twelve-year-old girl who lives at Three Tree Creek, Sunbury county, New Brunswick, wrote to C. E. Bonin, French consul here, offering her services as nurse with the French army. This young patriot is a daughter of F. U. Charrier, who came to Canada from France a year ago. The father served in the French artillery in 1887, and would have gone to the present war had conditions permitted. Finding that she is too young to serve at the front, little Miss Collette is now contenting herself with sewing things for the soldiers and in singing La Marseillaise at local entertainments given to raise funds for the good cause.
